GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOUR

Each issue we talk to a local identity, this edition it's Heathcote Junction resident Sharon McCarthy (Costanzo)

What brought your family to Heathcote Junction?

My family was very familiar with the area as my Great Grand Parents Charlie and Florence Simmonds lived in View Road and ran a boot repair shop, my Great Uncle Henry and Auntie Florrie Ross lived in Range Avenue. Uncle Henry worked for the Forest Commission, he found the missing pilot and plane that crashed in Mt Disappointment during WW2.

School Memories at Wandong

My family moved to Heathcote Junction in the 60's, we lived 4 miles from the school. Until Mum got her licence we would have to walk. A year later Dad built our home in Messmate Avenue, which was a much closer walk. You could cut through McDonald's paddocks, which is now built up with homes. My siblings Shane, Marcus, Lisa and Colleen all attended Wandong. I had already met my school teacher Miss Pat Rhodes as she boarded with my relatives in Range Avenue. Mr Jim Rogers was the Head Master. I have very fond memories of School Days at Wandong, the feeling of belonging, the smell of the old timber, breathing in the chalk dust and using an old ink pen and inkwell, and finally graduating to the biro in grade 4. A start to the school day was the ringing of an old bell as we assembled outside. Mondays were extra special as we sang "God Save the Queen" with hands on our hearts. Games played during recess were Charlie Over the water, hopscotch and the boys kicked the footy, besides that we had the log swing, slide and monkey bars to play on. Small bottles of milk were given out at playtime, sometimes these were left in the sun and used to make me feel sick.

Sports days were a highlight, especially when we competed against other local schools. My siblings always did well and returned with lots of ribbons. A cricket pitch was dug into the side of a hill in the bush paddock next door to the school, this was also a nature reserve for us.

What was the Social Life like back then?

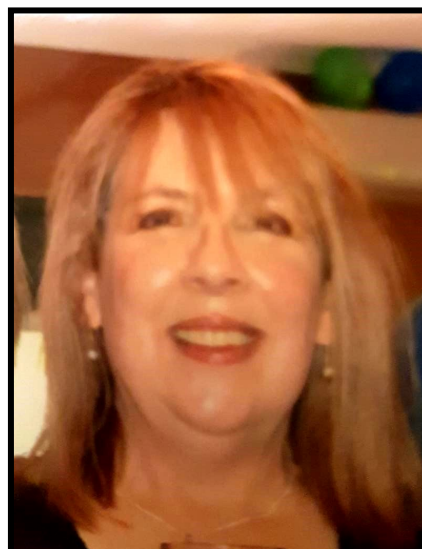
The first Friday of every month a dance was held at the Wandong Hall, always something to look forward to. Lottie Campbell played the piano. We watched the grown ups dance and sometimes joined in on the barn dance. Angus McDonald called out the Square dance, while we danced in the corner. Supper was well worth the wait. A box of cups would go around for each person to take and a huge teapot, jug of milk and sugar followed. A scrumptious supper of homemade cakes, scones and Joan Ryan's jam tarts

The School Christmas Concert was the event of the year, the classes put on plays and sang Christmas Carols.

Later years in 1975, we started the first Wandong Netball Club, playing against local towns.

What do you love about living here?

The Country atmosphere where most people are friendly and have respect for their local community. Wandong has a rich and interesting history which my great grand parents were part of. My husbands family were also from Wandong, his family were residents, workers and pupils at the Comet Mill at Heathcote Junction. My grandchildren now go to Wandong Primary school, a bit like history repeating itself.

WANDONG POLICE STATION

The Wandong Police Station operated for fifteen and a half years before closure. The station and residence was located on the Magpie and Stump Rd, the property being owned by R. A. Robertson. The former residence has now been replaced with a new home.

Constable Galvin was stationed there for four and a half years before being transferred to Melbourne in 1891, he was replaced by Constable J. J. Wilcox who took charge of the station on the 11th day of the 11th month. Due to the decision of the chief commissioner to close down the Wandong Police Station, Wilcox was retrenched after serving at Wandong for eleven years and departed on the 11th day of the 11th month of the year, receiving notice as he put it himself, at the 11th hour.

FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT

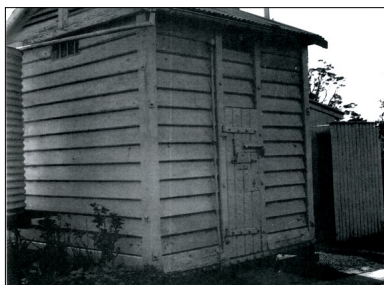

He has been a courteous and efficient officer indeed, we think every effort should be made to have him retained, as closing the station is false economy.

Owing to the retrenchment the police station here has been closed. Mr J.J Wilcox has been transferred to Stanley, the lock-up being sent to Nerrim South. On Friday evening last a farewell social was tendered in the Public Hall to Mr J. Wilcox police constable who has been in charge of the local police station for the last 11 years, prior to his departure for Stanley where he has been transferred. Mr G. E. Thompson occupied the chair, and there was a large attendance. The chairman in an appropriate speech referred to the regret which was felt at the departure of Mr Wilcox. During the time he has been here he had given every satisfaction and gained many sincere friends. On behalf of his friends at Wandong. The chairman then presented the guest with a handsome tea and coffee service, which bore the following inscription. "A souvenir to Mr and Mrs Wilcox as a token of esteem and regard by the residents of Wandong and districts." Messrs C. Daley, H. McDonald, C. Williams and G. E. Hall also testified to Mt Wilcox being of a courteous and agreeable manner in carrying out his duties. In returning thanks Mr. Wilcox stated that he regretted leaving Wandong and that he had always endeavoured to do his duty without fear or favour and was grateful for the token of esteem. The proceedings were enlivened by songs and dances.

POLICE ECONOMY KILMORE

The decision of the Commissioner in closing up the Wandong Police Station has given rise to serious complaints. Within a few miles of the township there are over 100 miners employed, and it has been the custom to employ the local constable to act as an escort when bringing the gold in from the mines. The Golden Dyke extended claims both wash-up next week, and no police protection can be granted in conveying the gold from the miners over the lonely mountain track.
