THEY CAME

Readers, this month we are interviewing Anglican Reverend Satvasheela Pandare known to us Aussies as Sheela. She was born in Pune in North India. Sheela comes to us with 16 years of experience in various ministries, after first serving as a deacon. Some being chaplaincy, teaching and the role of principal in the dioceses of Pune and Kolkata working in small and large churches and when reaching out to the community she spoke in Marathi encouraging the people around her.

She has now been a priest for twenty one years, being the first in her family and one of the first women in her area to be ordained.

Her investiture was not straightforward as women were not accepted in this role. She reminded God that He created her as a woman, knowing that there was a calling on her life to be in the priesthood. She waited for three weeks until God, working in His mysterious ways, changed the thoughts of these men who were previously unwilling to ordain her as a lady priest.

Facing many challenges in her faith walk, still not accepted by the men as women were not meant to be at the forefront of society.

God inspired her to study more in this difficult time, therefore completing her Masters and Doctorate of Theology, drawing on her faith, bringing her great joy during this difficult time, being a woman amongst men. She relied on the Joy of the Lord being her strength. Nehemiah 8 verse 10. Supporting her is her faithful husband Prashant who is a theological lecturer whose story I will share with you another day.

With no knowledge of Australia except that kangaroos live here, with heartfelt obedience they came, arriving in Adelaide during Covid restrictions on their way to Craigieburn to encourage the church, spreading the Good News of the Gospel. Sheela is now also a school chaplain at Hume Grammar as well as reaching out to the communities of Craigieburn, Wandong and surrounding areas.

Maybe you or I may not be called to another country. Sometimes though a person or family in need may require some help around their lives. Then they too can say -They Came, They Cared enough to come. They really came!

GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

What a difference a year makes, this time last year was drier, and we were able to get into the garden to enjoy our plants and the lovely Spring sun, without our gumboots LOL. Oh, my goodness, this year has been so wet for so long but with this came beautiful displays of Jonquils and Daffodils, some that didn't flower last year came up beautifully this year and it's been so easy pulling the weeds out and we didn't need to water our first lot of fertilisers in did we, because it rained. So even though it's been a long cold, wet Winter there has been lots of benefits. Daphne has now finished flowering so it's a great time to take cuttings. Cut from the plant just above a node and include some older wood on the stem. Make the cut angled and dip it into hormone growth powder or gel and directly into a potting media suitable for cuttings. This media may hold more moisture than a normal potting mix because the cuttings will take time to grow the new white fibrous roots but until then the cuttings need to be kept moist, not wet, to encourage the new roots. You can still take cuttings from Hydrangeas also using the same method, they are such tough plants, and the strike rate is usually 100 %. Roses are leafing nicely so keep the fertiliser up to them for optimum growth and keep an eye out for Aphids. An application of soapy water can deter these pests. Now is a good time to apply fertiliser to your lawn and if you have weeds through the grass, 'Weed and Feed' is a great product. If you are transplanting any plants, ensure that you take a generous lot of soil with them and have the hole where they are to go ready. The less time out of the ground and stressing, ensures a better success rate. As our bulbs finish and the green stems begin to die down use a liquid fertiliser that the stems can absorb quickly and take down to the bulb for storage until their next flowering season. Our veggie gardens are looking for new plantings and if you have prepared them already then, you're in front and if you're going with seeds try beetroot, carrot, dwarf beans, climbing beans, peas, lettuce and if you think our frosts have finished pop in tomatoes plants. Corn seems to have a better growth rate if you start with seeds, and it appears you get a taller plant. If you are covering your veggies and/or fruit trees keep in mind that regulations have been introduced stating the hole size in the netting has to be smaller than in previous years. Check it out. Talking about fruit trees, clear the area at the base of your fruit trees, especially Pear and Cherry trees, to deter the annoying Pear and Cherry slug. These skin-coloured slugs climb up the trunk and feed on the leaves, skeletonising them and thus



effecting the ability for the plant to absorb the sun as efficiently. As they mature you will find them easy on the leaves, they are black in colour but stopping them before they make the journey is preferable. Deciduous plants are looking beautiful, some with blossom, with new leaves pushing through, a real testament to Spring being here. What a beautiful season but keep weeds under control because before we know it the ground will dry, and those pesky weeds are going to be so hard to get out. Now is a good time to prune hedging that has finished flowering however, if your hedge is still flowering, prune directly after the flowering finishes and it's amazing to witness how the new growth takes off, if you stand still long enough you may even see it growing!

Inquiry Learning in Term Four

Foundation students will explore and investigate design and technology. Within this unit, students will first discover technologies throughout history, their uses, and advances made up to the present time. Students will engage in the engineering design process of brainstorming, designing, building, testing and improving their projects, before concluding the inquiry unit with a race day to celebrate their ideas and projects. Students will use a variety of different recyclable materials to construct their models, which links to our whole school Sustainability focus for next term.

Grade One/Two students will be investigating the significant role pollinators play in our environment and how they contribute towards the survival of our ecosystems. We will investigate how pollinators help to grow food and plant-based products for society, the problems that occur with declining pollinator numbers and how we can help to improve the wellbeing of our pollinators.

Our Grade Three/Four students will explore and learn to utilise their creative, innovative and imaginative ideas and approaches to design and construct a "Killer Kite". They will do this by following the design process, by planning and building their awareness of the characteristics and properties of materials, as well as tools and equipment needed to construct a kite. Students will learn to regularly reflect on their actions and results and use this information to refine and improve their work. During this unit, students will explore and build on their understanding of what goes into designing and creating things we use day-to-day, and using the following focus questions in order to do so: What is the design process? How do materials affect the behaviour of designs? How do we communicate ideas using Mathematics?

Similarly, the Grade Five/Six students will be exploring our driving question: 'How does design impact performance?' They will follow the design principles and explore examples of great inventions from the past, as the foundation to consider how mathematics drives innovation and progress in our contemporary world. Students will describe how design and technologies contribute to meeting present and future needs. By negotiating and developing ideas, they will research, plan, test and modify their designs to seek new opportunities for improving their future.

The Fire Season is approaching- Prepare Now

Our year-to-date rainfall has provided our paddocks with waterlogged ground, we can expect some substantial grass growth this season. The fire risk forecast is focusing on grass fires this year. With the wind behind them grassfires can move as fast as you can run with flame heights of several metres depending on the amount of fuel.

Now is the time to start your clean up. If you chose to build fire piles for burning off, then do this as early as possible. You will be surprised how quickly a bonfire will dry off the surrounding area and spread. Firstly, register your burn off by phoning 1800 668 511 or register online through the CFA website https://firepermits.vic.gov.au/notify Online registration can only be done for fires that will commence in more than two hours' time. You will receive a notification to confirm that your registration was successful.

Burn off registration is important to prevent unnecessary call outs of the fire brigade. People doing the correct action will phone 000 to report what they believe is a fire out of control. When emergency services receive the 000 call, they cross reference with their registrations and the information they have regarding the location and the size of the burn.

Registration of burn offs is mandatory; it is a requirement of local government bylaws.

CFA community bushfire engagement information sessions are held every year, get the whole family involved in an understanding of what happens on what we call bad days. Remember that the difference between a good summer and a bad summer maybe just one single day.

It is up to you to put your plans into place now by clearing up around your home, keeping grass levels low and having a definite family and farm fire plan.

Ensure that your property is accessible to CFA tankers; can the CFA tanker fit through your gate, can fire tankers turn around at the end of your driveway? Are there overhanging branches in your driveway?

Do we stay or do we leave early? This decision has to made long time before there is a fire. Do you have the resources to save your family and home if a fire front moves across your property? Resources also include the ability to stay calm and to think and act in a logical safe manner. You will also need to be fit and be in good health. Your household needs to keep to the plan and agree on the safest outcome. Priority for planning is about SURVIVAL of your family and not saving assets. The safest way is to leave early, well before a fire is in the immediate locality. Include in your plan pets, horses and livestock. They cannot all fit in your car! Create or use a dedicated safer place on your property for horses and livestock. WHAT IS YOUR TRIGGER POINT TO LEAVE EARLY?

It is extremely dangerous to round up horses and to try placing them in a float to escape when the fire front is close to your property or neighbourhood. Do not compromise your own survival. Take notice of the fire predictions and weather forecasts. On bad days, check the CFA web page and the Vic Emergency phone apps often. Set up your watch zone on the app for a radius around where you live.

It is not only the people who live on rural properties that need to prepare for the fire season. Subdivisions such

as Waterford Park are subject to ember attack in fires. Leaves and debris on the roof and gutters need removal now. Consider removing of branches that are within two metres of house or roof.

If you require any advice on fire prevention, especially if you are new to the area, then officers of the brigade will be happy to provide you with information and publications.



Coaching for carers is often about taking time out to think about how they are going, how they'd like things to be and how they might take steps towards making that happen.

The Carer Gateway Coaching support is offered as:

- 1. Self-guided coaching Interactive on-line coaching sessions are available for carers to complete at their own pace. Each session includes information, practical tips, resources, reflection activities and stories from Australian carers. To access this on-line support visit https://coaching.carergateway.gov.au/
- 2. Facilitated Coaching a one-to-one service where carers engage with a coach in a series of one hour sessions.

Facilitated coaching is:

- •a free coaching service for carers
- •evidence based
- •short-term support that boosts capacity and capability of carers
- •aimed at assisting carers to acquire (or increase) skills and resilience within their caring role

Facilitated coaching can assist carers with:

- •identifying their key needs
- •increasing sense of empowerment
- •learn, improve or implement strategies and skills to support their own wellbeing

Facilitated coaching is non-therapeutic. It is not designed as crisis intervention.

Coaching is generally chosen for those seeking practical changes & improvements in personal lives e.g. achieve financial security, increase fitness etc.

- ★ Facilitated Coaching provides time, space and support you require to work out what you want your future to look like and how to move towards it
- Your coach will support you in working out what it is that you want to change how you want your life to be and finding ways to achieve it
- Your coach can support you with practical changes & improvements you would like to make in your daily life

Bushfire Prevention

Fires can occur where the suburbs meet the bush, particularly if you have grass, bushland or parkland around your home. NOW is the time to get your house and property fire ready.

Fine fuels, such as thin branches, twigs and leaves, ignite quickly and burn easily. These can be carried by the wind and can end up long distances ahead of the fire. Heavy fuels such as branches, trees and logs, take longer to ignite but will burn for longer and they create an extremely hot fire. Our tips will help prepare your property:

- · Clean out your gutters, roofs and downpipes to remove leaves and clear around the base of trees;
- Keep your lawns short (under 10cm long) and well-watered;
- · Maintain your garden by removing weeds, pruning bushes and trees, especially under windows;
- Keep your garden beds moist using non-flammable ground covers like pebbles, sand or rocks. Decomposed
 mulch is safer than new mulch unless kept wetted down;
- · Store flammable and combustible materials, such as wood piles and rubbish, away from your house; and
- Cut back branches within 10 metres of buildings.

Gas BBQ's

Spring is also a great time to light up your barbeque and enjoy it with your family. It can also end up as a disaster if you haven't prepared your gas barbeque and it bursts into flames.

When preparing for your barbeque, follow our hints to keep everyone safe:

- Check to see if the gas bottle is damaged. DON'T try to refill it, instead exchange it at a reputable supplier;
- Check the hose to make sure it hasn't deteriorated. Spray the hose and regulator connections with soapy water. If bubbles appear, you'll know that gas is escaping. If so, replace your hose.
- · Check that the barbeque is CLEAN. Excess fat or residue can cause a fire.
- Keep plenty of clear space between your barbeque and anything inflammable;
- Keep a WATCH on your flame. If it goes out the unburnt gas levels can build up to dangerous levels. If this
 happens, turn off the gas at the cylinder. WAIT a few minutes before you reignite the barbeque again; and
- NEVER use a barbeque indoors.

IF A FIRE DOES START FROM A GAS LEAK, DON'T TRY TO EXTINGUISH THE FLAMES. TURN OFF THE GAS AT THE CYLINDER, BUT ONLY WHEN IT'S SAFE TO DO SO.

Smoke Detectors

Smoke detectors are required by law in all new properties. Older, existing properties are advised to have smoke detectors

- · You should have a working smoke detector for every bedroom and the living area;
- · You should connect your smoke detectors to each other, so that when one sounds, they all sound.
- TEST them every month and replace the 9 volt battery and clean them EVERY YEAR; and
- REPLACE the smoke detector at least every 10 years.

In Victoria, it is the responsibility of a Landlord to properly fit and maintain smoke detectors in each residential property. These must comply with the Australian Standard A.S. 3786-1993.


Dealing with Parasites.....

Choosing what is best for your Dog can certainly be a confusing issue....!

We are bombarded with products that we are told are the best on the market... Magazines, TV adverts and even now thru social media we are encouraged, even pushed to buy these products for monthly "preventions" but are they really of any value....??? Could they even be harmful....???

It seems that for the last 10 years or so common sense has taken a holiday - Just consider if you have a child in school and you hear



The same applies to **Gut Worming**... Now with horses and cattle we can have a simple poo sample assessed to see if and what worming is required... no worms no treatment needed.....

Over the last 20 years we have been pushed to use a worming treatment every month and this is now seen as the "Norm" ... previously we have only wormed dogs every change of season... and for 50 years this served us well... In this enlightened times, we should ask.... "Why there isn't there the opportunity to apply a poo sample assessment for our dogs... just like with horses"..?

We are also confronted with another demon, **Heartworm**, which first became talked about in the 80's. Initially we were told we must have a blood sample prior to using any treatment... otherwise there was a danger that the product could kill a dog who was already infected.... Then suddenly the product is available on the supermarket shelves....!!!

Warning... Early in 2020 a Fact Sheet was published by the FDA (U.S. Food & Drug Administration).... An update was again published in April 2021. This is warning Pet Owners and Veterinarians about potential adverse events associated with Isoxazoline Flea and Tick Products.

Even thou we have these products are now in question, many are still available in Australia and are sold thru veterinary clinics and pet stores. Products under question: *Bravecto, Bravetco Plus, Nexgard, Nexgard Spectra, Simpatico, Simpatico Trio, Interceptor, Revolution and Revolution plus* and perhaps some others.

As many of these products can be problematic for dogs (particularly those who are MDR1 sensitive) it becomes difficult to know what is safe to use on your dog Personally, I decided it would be easier to learn more about how heart-worm is transmitted. So consider this....

Firstly it appears that one dog cannot infect another dog... instead the spread is via a mozzie... So a mozzie bites an infected dog and then actually has to extract the microfilariae from the blood. This has to then live in the mozzie for a week or more to develop into the heart worm larvae and then this mozzie has to bite another dog where the larvae can develop further.... Oh! I forgot to say that it is only spread by the FEMALE mozzie... AND... if the temperature falls below 14 degrees for a couple of days then the mozzie dies... Hence if you live in Florida or perhaps Northern Qld, then this might be an issue.... As I live in central Victoria I have not seen the need to use any heart worm treatments.... At least NOT during the last 40 years.....

As guardians to our dogs health we must consider how chemicals can affect our dogs...

We should learn effective and responsible ways to treat dogs for fleas and worms.... After all do we really need to use chemical for 'preventative'? ... or is it more about the profit these products make? ... After all Companies don't want us to limit the use of their products... imagine the loss in their sales if we just changed our worming program to 3 times a year instead of every month!!!!

Maintenance issues at Wandong Heathcote Junction

In August the Wandong Heathcote Junction Community Group wrote to Mitchell Shire Council asking for 20 maintenance issues in Wandong Heathcote Junction be rectified. The WHJCG was satisfied with most of the responses but issues such as those below were taken up again in a letter in September.

In April 2018 Mitchell Shire officers committed to three monthly meetings with members of the WHJCG This has never happened.

MSC advised that the mesh fence on Rail Street is maintained by Vic Railways. This is incorrect. The fence was handed to Mitchell Shire to maintain several years ago. However if MSC believes it can have VicTrack repair the fence and have requested it to do so, please advise when the work will be completed.

The WHJCG withdrew an offer to pay half the cost of a sculpture to replace the decayed wooden sculpture. This was due to the red tape, lack of assistance and rejection by MSC. What is MSC doing to replace decayed sculpture?

We thanked MSC for replacing five rubbish bins with the modern larger bins but ask for a sixth bin to be included in the project. This bin is situated at the toilets in the Wandong Bushfire Memorial Park car park and is pictured attached. It regularly overflows with rubbish, often attacked by birds and is very unattractive in this prominent tourist / visitor stop.

The drain in Rail Street around the corner from Affleck Street has not been cleared or the problem rectified by MSC as claimed. It is only cleared by the WHJCG to stop water crossing Rail Street when the drain is blocked. The attached is photos taken on 24th September 2022 showing the blocked grate and after mud removal by the WHJCG.

It should be acknowledged that it was the Wandong Heathcote Junction community that paid \$100 for each pin oak tree that today provides the avenue along the Epping Kilmore Road at Wandong. We take great pride in their growth and beauty and to not be consulted on pruning is very disappointing. "Professional arborists" would never cause such destruction of these trees and nothing was done about "height clearance requirements" as claimed. The removal of the lower branches has ruined the total display these trees provided and has opened up areas such as the railway car park to view from the Epping Kilmore Road.






LEFT TOP:
