

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# ALMOST 200 YEARS SINCE HUME AND HOVELL PASSED THROUGH WANDONG

Now that it has been established that the correct route taken by Hamilton Hume and William Hovell in 1824 was through Wandong instead of Kilmore, the Wandong History Group are making arrangements to commemorate the 200 year old journey. Hume and Hovell travelled south along what later became the Wandong-Broadford road. It took them straight through the middle of Wandong, across Arkells Lane and up to the watershed peak on the Great Dividing Range that is 1260 metres South of Arkells Lane. Having crossed the peak Hume continued to ride in front along Eastern Ridge, Wallan (Happy Valley) to about the now Emelia Court intersection, according to the accurate measurements left by William Hovell. Hume led the party off the ridge to the left in a South by East direction and they camped that night on the Merri Creek at about present-day Kelby Lane, Wallan.

### **GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL**

Well, Autumn is here and that brings varying jobs in our garden. After the first good rain we can commence pruning to help regenerate, reshape and clear plants from dead or damaged branches. Cooler weather reduces dehydration within the plant and the thicker the branch pruned, the more chance of dehydration. It is favourable to prune on a cooler day, after it has rained, or you have watered. If you are pruning Lavender, never prune into the dead wood as this can kill the hardy Lavender and don't forget, the pieces you prune off can be used as cuttings for new plants. Ensure, for cuttings you take some hard, or older wood and cut on an angle to give more surface area for a better success rate and these should strike well, particularly, if you use hormone rooting gel or powder. Autumn is a great time with the intense heat of Summer subsiding it's very inviting to get out into the garden. Weeding, mulching and deep watering is so essential to encourage roots deeper, reducing shallow roots that are then more susceptible to drying out. Some plants, however, are naturally shallow rooting such as Camellias, Rhododendrons and Azaleas, and these plants require generous mulching to stop the hot weather drying out their roots. Even though it's Autumn, we are still having warm days, but the cooler mornings are lovely and with the shorter days our deciduous plants have already started to colour up and as Autumn progresses colours will intensify. We will see colours of bronze, orange, green, red, claret and mixes of all especially with the Chinese Pistachio. A pretty small tree growing to about 5 metres high by about 2-3 metres wide and these estimates may vary depending on soil type, location and other influences which of course can affect all our plants. Larger growing deciduous plants such as Claret Ash, Golden Ash, Pin Oak, Oak, Elm, Ornamental Pear, Robinia pseudoacacia and Plane Tree, just to name a few are absolutely stunning as mature plants. The Liquidambar tree is amazing, but it can be a bit of a nuisance with its root system, with underground pipes etc. Visit some gardens to appreciate the beauty of Autumn, Mt Macedon, Lancefield, Woodend and the main throughfare through Wandong, very tastefully planted. After viewing mature varieties and if you are in the market to add a deciduous plant to your garden, source your favourite/s from a reputable nursery because it may be a good idea to order now, ready for planting in a couple of months. After the Autumn rains begin, start your hole preparation ready for the Autumn planting. Hopefully the ground will soften enough and make it a bit easier for digging because it's been a few months since we've had decent rain and the ground can be hard in some areas of our gardens. Remember to allow quite a bit of room for your new plantings and the ideal size of hole per pot plant is twice the depth and width. Sometimes, with hard ground you can be tempted to skimp on hole size but try not to because a hole not big enough may retard the expansion of the new roots that are trying to push into fresh ground, and this may result in the root ball continuing to stay in that shape, thus the plant will not do well, not grow well and be stunted. Take your time when preparing to plant, it will absolutely pay you back. If you are planting on the side of a hill, try to ensure that the



high side of the hole is below the ground level on the lower side, this will aid in water being absorbed into the hole when you pop the plant in. This will work if you have prepared your ground with well-rotted cow manure, some gypsum and / or any organic matter that can improve the soil structure, absorption and drainage, so, so important. When you're ready to choose your new plants, look at the area they will be planted into, ensure they can reach their maximum height without overhead trees, power lines or other obstructions impeding their growth, will their mature size and root system interfere with underground pipes and / or drainage? Enjoy the first month of Autumn and we'll chat next month.





Steel poles that support the mural have been added to the retaining wall at the rear of the Wandong Plaza car park and arrangements are now being made to transport the mural to the Plaza and join it to the poles.



### MEETING WITH MITCHELL SHIRE COUNCIL

In response to letters exchanged with Mitchell Shire regarding projects and the maintenance problems in Wandong Heathcote Junction, Mitchell Shire officers met three of our members on Friday 17th February. Some results of discussions are as follows

- HUME AND HOVELL MEMORIAL TO REPLACE ROTTEN WOODEN SCULPTURE - Since Wandong has been recognised as the true route taken by Hume and Hovel in 1824, the Wandong History Group and the WHJCG want to recognise this in 2024, the bi century, but Mitchell Shire cannot meet to discuss until late 2023. Time is running out to create the memorial and put a program together.
- FOOTPATH MAINTENANCE (CRACKED CEMENT PAVEMENT RAIL ST / BITUMEN NTH MTN RD - Mitchell Shire agreed to revisit decisions previously made that footpaths did not warrant maintenance.
- TOILET / BBQ CLEANING AND SCHEDULE (CAR PARK RUBBISH BIN TO BE REPLACED IN FEBRUARY) - Mitchell Shire agreed to increase frequency.
- RUBBISH BIN OVERFLOWING the new rubbish bin for the toilet area in the Memorial Park was to be installed in February but did not happen.
- BUSHFIRE MEMORIAL PARK CAR PARK (BITUMEN, BOLLARDS, DRAIN) - we were told nothing is planned in the near future but we should submit the project for consideration in the budget which we have done.
- PLAYGROUND UPGRADE AT MEMORIAL PARK there is no plan to upgrade this playground and again we were told to submit it for consideration in the budget which we have.
- THE MESH FENCE ALONG RAIL STREET / RAIL RESERVE
  - Mitchell Shire insist that the green mesh fence along Rail Street is the responsibility of VicTrack and will write to them - WHJCG believes the fence was handed to Mitchell Shire to maintain.
- THE LAND AT THE CORNER OF RAIL STREET AND WANDONG AVE
  - Mitchell Shire has no plan to make this area car parking for the Wandong Hall. We may have to do it ourselves as the hall is

in desperate need of more car parking.

There has been several loads of rubbish dumped (see photo) beside the Wandong Broadford Road at Clonbinane - Mitchell Shire was advised and asked for comment but no response vet.







### THE BROADFORD CEMETERY TRUST

The Broadford Cemetery Trust is seeking expressions of interest from suitably qualified members of the community who would be interested in becoming honorary trust members. Women and those from a diverse background are actively encouraged to seek appointment.

Cemetery trust members are appointed by the Governor in Council for a term of up to five years on the recommendation of the Minister for Health. Cemetery trusts are responsible for the proper and efficient management of the public cemeteries under their control, including planning for future cemeteries services and the preservation of local history.



### Pruning and propagating

Members of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea [Club] under the leadership Marie Mack each month join with the Whittlesea Community Garden [WCG] to visit citizen's gardens. These visits are planned for the first Wednesday of the month, and generally occur after the PROBUS meeting on the first Monday.

But in March the garden visit came first and twenty allied gardeners learnt about propagating and pruning which seemed appropriate as the same actions were to happen at the Club's annual general meeting.

Keith and Bev [BJ] Sutton are the driving force behind the WGC and each month find a blooming good garden for their members to visit. This couple are true examples of how volunteering brings results and satisfaction. The garden visit was to Doreen where an associate of some members welcomed the visitors to a unique landside garden.

In 2015 there were many new subdivisions appearing in Doreen. Council was struggling to keep up with all the new areas that needed attention once the sub dividers handed over to them. One was the area which borders on Ivanhoe Grammar Mernda Campus and became Twist Walk.

A resident has an illness which cannot tolerate chemicals, approached Council to ensure no weeds were being sprayed along Twist Walk. After much discussion permission was given to weed and care for the area along with other interested permanent residents who loosely formed Twist Walk Residents Group!

As the clay area was not conducive to most of the sub-divider's plants, over 80 natives were obtained mostly by donation and planted within this area. Many hours of bucket watering during the drought years kept the young new natives growing. Council has also helped by supplying compost/chip bark for the area every three years.

Over the past 8 years many plants have lived and died. The garden has attracted birds, bees and butterfly that mingle with indigenous wildlife. The dog and wildlife water bowl is available beside the path along with bird baths higher up!

Due to the 12 beautiful old gum trees along the fence line, water is the biggest issue. The residents have provided three soaker hoses to help. But many of the plants still struggle to meet their full potential! However, as the years go by they are adapting and growing with the extra water supplied and as the different seasons change. Visitors enjoy promenading down Twist Walk breathing in the fresh air and enjoying the scent of the native gums, and plants.

The Whittlesea visitors were awestruck to see what had been achieved. The nomenclature of the different plants both botanical and everyday was a popular topic. The achievement of the main resident who has bouts of illness is more that commendable. After the group savoured the fragrance and occasional bird call a morning tea brought the excitement to an end.

The Annual General Meeting was held on Monday 6 March at the Whittlesea Bowls Club. The induction of new members, Denise Inglis, Sue and Glen Giri and the attendance of five visitors reflect the success and hard work of the outgoing Management Committee under President Alessandra Testa.

Before the election a eulogy and a minutes silence was held for member Marg Hale who had died recently. Keith Mason a past president took the chair and declared all positions vacant and asked for nominees. Keith and Jenny who was the meet and greet officer for the past several years are leaving soon on a grey nomad tour for the rest of 2023. The election was a foregone conclusion as nominations had been secured at the February meeting. In line with the gardening theme Keith Miller was grafted on as President. Cheryl Manicolo will add Vice President to her Secretarial duties, and the immediate past President Alessandra Testa will take over as Treasurer from Roma Harris who continues in a less exacting role.

Coral Strange [Hospitality] has served morning tea for fourteen years and Andrew McCormick who has been membership officer for seven or more years, together with Rosalie Johnson who looked after welfare resigned their commissions.

Our firefighters were doing long days and it was lovely to come back to some cold soft drinks or icy poles that had been delivered to the fire station. We are still cleaning the dust from the vehicles (so much dust!), and think we may treat them to a good detail at the end of the season.

The recent fires in Beveridge, Flowerdale and Maintongoon (near Bonnie Doon) have demonstrated that there is still a significant fire risk and precautions need to be made. Fire restrictions remain in place, and at this stage will remain in place until May 1<sup>st</sup> 2023. This means you cannot light a fire in the open air unless you have a permit or comply with certain requirements. If you don't obtain a permit, you could be breaking the law and may be prosecuted.

Many carers find that they go through different 'stages' during their caring role. It's useful to understand that these stages are normal, and you can get help at every stage.

It's also useful to realise that you may go through some stages several times. Every caring situation is different.

### **Noticing changes**

You may start your caring role by noticing something wrong with someone close to you. The changes may be physical or mental. You may notice changes happening quickly or over a long time. It might take some time to find out what's wrong. If you are at this stage, you can:

- talk with family and friends about what you have noticed
- talk with your doctor about what you have noticed
- look for information online about symptoms and possible diagnoses

#### Confirmation

You may start your caring role when you receive a diagnosis from a health professional. You may need to make decisions about treatment and care. It's a good idea to find out as much as you can about the condition and what you can expect.

If you are at this stage, you can:

- talk with your doctor about what you can expect and what treatment they recommend
- talk with family and friends and start planning care
- look for information online about the condition and possible treatments

#### **Surviving**

Once you know about the condition of the person you care for, you start a routine of treatment and care. You work out what they need in health care and personal care, and you contact health professionals who might help you. If you are at this stage, you can:

- talk with Carer Gateway about what support you can get (call 1800 422 737 Monday to Friday between 8am and 5pm)
- talk with your doctor or other health professionals about equipment or strategies that might help you
- talk with other carers who care for people with the same or similar conditions (you can join our online carer forum)

#### Managing

At this stage, you have set up a routine and organised some of the support you need. This stage can be stable, but you can also experience emergencies that take you back to the Surviving stage.

If you are at this stage, you can:

- make an emergency care plan
- find out what other help you can get at home or in the community
- explore ways to manage your stress

### **Thriving**

At this stage, you have not only established routines for the person you care for, but know how to handle emergencies and have ongoing ways to care for yourself and manage your stress.

If you are at this stage, you can:

- take a break and get help when you need it
- have time for yourself and for your other family and friends
- return to work or study

#### Life after caring

At some stage, your caring role may come to an end – either when the person you care for recovers, when they die, or when they leave your care and other people take over the caring role. You may need to deal with grief, and will need to plan for your life after caring.

If you are at this stage, you can:

- get personal or grief counselling
- talk with other carers who may have experienced the end of care
- join community groups

# Clonbinane Rural Fire Brigade



### Weather Forecast

Clonbinane has experienced a dry start to the year and this dry weather is forecast to continue throughout autumn. The nights are becoming cooler. We may still experience severe fire weather even in late March.

### **Fire Danger Status**

The fire risk remains elevated due to very dry grasslands. Even on cool days, if a fire starts in grasslands, then strong southerly or westerly winds can create a fast and severe fire. We experienced this with the Mickleham fire of February 2014 that started at Mickleham and travelled quickly in a northerly direction all the way to Pyalong.

The fire danger season is not over; taking into consideration the long dry grass that remains in many paddocks and roadsides. We can experience heat waves in March, however significant fires can emerge with strong cooler southerly winds if there is an ignition point in dry grass. We are still in the declared Fire Danger Period which means no burning off is allowed <u>regardless of weather conditions</u>. You may also experience planned fuel reduction burns later in the autumn and may smell or see smoke. There will be notifications of planned burns in the media.

We are approaching the big camping weekends of Labour Day Weekend and Easter. With numerous people using the forest, we have added risks of fires. We will cover campfires this month so that you are aware of the rules.

Please continue to be active in fire prevention work. There have been considerable amounts of leaves dropping. Don't wait for a fire to start to prompt you to clean the roof gutters or around your home.

### **Brigade Activity**

The Clonbinane CFA has been busy with many call outs to grassfires and were kept very active with the recent Flowerdale fire and more recently to the fire near Eildon.

### **Campfires**

If you are camping over the Labour Day Long Weekend or Easter and have a fire, you must have an area cleared in at least 3 metres in all directions and have water available to extinguish a fire. In National and State Parks, campfires and barbecues may only be lit in designated constructed fireplaces provided. A ring of rocks is not considered a fireplace under these terms. Do not deposit glass, aluminium, plastic, rubbish or scrap food products into your campfire. Please take these home with you. Leaving these items at your campsite is littering and subject to on-the-spot fines.

Do not light a fire or maintain a fire on warm or hot days when wind speed is in excess of 10 KPH. This is one of conditions that allows us to have campfires on public land such as forest camping areas. In NSW campfires are banned in the declared fire danger period. In Victoria campfires are allowed for cooking or warmth if the fire safety conditions are being followed.

A responsible adult must always attend and supervise a solid fuel campfire or barbeque. In attendance means being within 50 metres and having line of sight from the outer perimeter of your solid fuel campfire or barbecue. You must always fully extinguish your campfire with water, not dirt scraped over the top of it.

You cannot leave any hot embers remaining in your campfire. Remember, if your campfire is cool to touch, it is safe to leave. Ensure you have adequate water available to extinguish a fire before you light it. Our nearby forest camp areas do not have water available; you must bring it in with you. Check CFA and DEECA websites for further details on the rules and law related to campfires.





### Desexing your Dog .... Why and When.....!

**Some History:** The desexing program was started back in the 1970's when local laws about dogs where often pretty relaxed so it was common to see dogs wandering at large in suburban streets of Melbourne. Often silly young male dogs hanging around in packs outside houses when a bitch was in season. But this is NOT the same now due, to the vast majority of owners that keep their dogs in secure yards.

Councils, Welfare groups and Vet Practices push the idea of desexing our family pets.... Many Councils charge higher prices for dogs who are entire (Note Mitchell Shire's sensible approach allows for entire pups UP TO 12 months to have the lower fee) Some Councils have even introduced 'mandatory' desexing which really seems to be an overstep into an individuals personal rights to make their own choices. I suspect this is just another sign of nervous Politicians pandering to the noisy minority with the illusion that it will gain votes. However, this is a slippery slope to reducing the ability to find an affordable new pup in the next 5-10 years time.

Consider the Math: There is an estimated 4.2 million dogs in Australia, so if we consider that dogs might have a 10-12 year life then we require nearly 400,000 puppies each year just to replace the dogs who die from accident or old age.... Hobby breeders belonging to the National Kennel Association only produce around 70,000 per year and there are limited local individuals having even just a one off litter, which means most families will then be trying to source a pup thru the Commercial Pet Industry. But these Companies then mass produce and often cater to fashionable trends which then can lead to inflated prices and poor environmental development of pups.


**Get a Rescue Dog:** This is the argument that welfare groups will use... However there are often factors these groups don't take into consideration..... Most dogs thru rescue are NOT puppies,.... Many families DON'T want an older dog nor is an older dog always suitable for the family as they may have behaviour or health issues.... So if there is a limited number of healthy pups locally where will these Rescue Pups come from in the future...? Perhaps we will even see puppies 'rescued' from overseas countries (as we are already seeing with 'street dogs' taken from the developing countries or being 'saved' from meat markets, then flown over, into quarantine to fill the USA needs)... So does this mean that we just end up just sending 'Puppy Farming' offshore in future.....???

**Desex Benefits are often just a Myth:** If your dog gets to 6-9 months and starts showing bad behaviours (such as humping, over-excitement, high prey drive, or anxiety) So then you 'google', read social media or even ask many Vets... you might be led too believe that desexing will solve these problems. This is just a Myth.

Having bred and trained dogs for decades.... I will say... in the vast majority of cases desexing **DOES NOT** change your dogs behaviour... Bad Behaviour is Bad Behaviour.... You need to address the problem by learning where you have failed to put in the boundaries to that help to create good behaviour.

When to Desex? - There's no problem with desexing your pet, just consider that experienced Breeders often recommend waiting till your dog develops both mentally and physically prior to desexing. The diagram below shows the Canine Growth Plate Development. With a medium sized breed such as a Border Collie we should wait until your dog is towards the older scale. So at least after 14 months. In fact, Dogs Victoria and Monash Animal Hospital published a paper in 2018 to announce they do not recommend juvenile desexing.... Due to feedback from many of the science studies......Although many Vets are starting to follow this recommendation there are still Veterinary Practices that will often recommend desex at 5-6 months old...??

As a simple explanation: it is our understanding, that the Oestrogen produced by your puppy helps to builds the bone structure during the first year of your pups life. (Note: even in male pups the testosterone is then converted to oestrogen). (© Original property - this is not to be reproduced without the written permission of the author)





### New road rules

New road rules are being introduced on 31 March, 2023, to regulate the use of a range of portable, wearable and inbuilt devices while driving a vehicle or riding a motorbike.

The rules reflect the significant increase of in-vehicle technologies capable of distracting a driver. The new road rules cover:

- Portable devices unmounted mobile phones & tablets;
- Wearable devices smart watches & wearable heads-up displays;
- Inbuilt devices navigational & entertainment systems;
- Mounted devices all devices mounted in or on a vehicle; &
- Motorbike helmet device.





- · Touch a portable device to enter text, numbers or symbols. This also includes devices which are switched off;
- · Scroll (on websites, social media or playlists);
- Play videos, games or take video calls;
- Display text messages, social media, emails or photos;
- Rest a device on any part of the body or clothes (unless it is in a pocket or attached to your belt or in a pouch);
   or
- Pass a device to a passenger. You are also not allowed to look at the display of a device operated by your passenger.

You can:

- · Connect to your vehicle's Bluetooth and place the device out of sight and reach BEFORE you start driving; and
- Use a mobile phone or other device to pay at a drive-through.

### **Exceptions**

- An inbuilt or commercially mounted device can be used to play music, used for audio calls, or use a navigation function, but you must not touch, scroll, read a message or make a video call.
- Smart watches can be used using voice controls only. They do allow for incidental contact of these devices
  caused by wearing the device.
- When using motorbike helmets with smart functions, they allow for the brief touching of the device.
- Stricter rules are in place for L & P platers as they have to park the vehicle before using any of these devices within a vehicle.
