

The large Dau family of seventeen children had its fair share of loss to war and heartache in the very early days of Wandong's history.

We also remembered Scottie McIntosh, who was lost on the Montevideo Maru, more about that in a separate article.

GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

Hi for May. Even though it's the last month of Autumn and Winter is around the corner, don't snooze because there's plenty of work to do in the garden and such a great time to get busy and get warm. Weed growth has slowed which is great but you may still have old growth from the previous seasons so get busy and get it out from any unwanted areas, around your established plants, out of paved areas, anywhere that it doesn't belong. The soil is softer and there should be less stress to the root systems but be careful not to dig too deep for the weeds, reducing damage to the roots. Winter is a great time to start new garden beds, establish new paved areas, and it's a great 'clean-up' season. Remove any debris from your garden which will reduce habitats for unwanted nasties such as mice, rats, spiders, snakes and rabbits. Moving things now will reduce the risk of moving them when the nasties are active but take care what might be hibernating under that piece of metal, etc. Good quality gardening gloves are an essential part of your gardening attire, it's that extra layer that biting and stinging things need to penetrate before you get hurt and if anyone has ever been bitten by a bull ant, it's not pleasant. May is also a good time to prune fruit trees. This is done to reshape and keep the plant open in its growth to allow light into the centre of the plant. Take out branches that are growing inwards and always cut on an angle just above a healthy node, keeping in mind that the way the node is facing or pointing is where the new branch will grow. Get rid of branches crossing over other branches and any unhealthy, split branches. Always keep around the base of fruit trees clean, free from weeds, or any debris to avoid unwanted pests such as Pear and Cherry slug, they love to 'overwinter' at the base of our trees and emerge in Spring as clear coloured slugs. They climb the trees and as they reach maturity they darken in colour and skeletonise the leaves by sucking the goodness out of them. This won't kill the plant, but it can weaken it because less green leaves results in less ability for the plant to photosynthesize. Some people apply a gel around the lower part of the trunk to deter these slug type pests reaching the leafy part of the plant. If you don't notice these pests until the warmer months, you may need to use a systemic spray that will be ingested by the slug. If you haven't done so already, get some fertiliser onto your Rhododendron, Azalea,



Daphne and Camellia plant/s. Use a liquid fertiliser that can be absorbed quickly and give the plants nearly an instant hit. They will begin to flower soon and will benefit from the feeding. Actually, it's not a bad idea to fertilise all your plants as we head into Winter, a bit like us, they don't want to be hungry in the cold weather, leaves can turn yellow/bronze and give the whole plant an unhealthy appearance. Lawns can also benefit from a feed and aerating to allow for deep waterings during Winter. Another fantastic job I really look forward to at this time of the year is planting. Cool weather, softer soil, great digging conditions and the plants settle in well before the warmer weather, such a good time to choose your fruit trees and deciduous plants boasting beautiful Autumn colours.

WANDONG HISTORY GROUP

Found at Last





It was Australia's worst maritime disaster: a US submarine torpedoed the ship unaware that it was packed with prisoners captured in Papua New Guinea.

The Montevideo Maru sank in July 1942.

An estimated 979 Australians died, along with 33 Norwegian sailors and 20 Japanese guards and crew.


An Australian maritime archaeology group, Silentworld Foundation, organised the mission, helped by a Dutch deep-sea survey company called Fugro. The wreck was located by an autonomous underwater vehicle (AUV) at a depth of more than 4,000m (13,123ft) - deeper than the Titanic wreck.

Captain Roger Turner, a technical specialist in the search team, told the BBC that "it's a war grave now, it's a tomb that must be treated with appropriate respect". The closest the AUV got to the wreck was 45m, he said.

"It was a moment of emotion to see the images of the ship, the closed hatch covers where prisoners were kept on the voyage." The wreck will not be disturbed - human remains or artefacts will not be removed.



On this ship was one of Wandong's own, Andrew George Rex Reekie "Scottie" McIntosh was one of the prisoners of war on the ship. Andrew was born in Lethendy Perthshire, in the Stormont District of Scotland on the 19th June 1908. His parents Charles and Mary Agnes had ten other children, Scottie and his older brother Robert (born 1901) came to Australia, Scottie arriving in the 1930's. He met up with Robert and they both came to Heathcote Junction where they worked carting wood. Gold fever struck and the boys began prospecting, when Scottie enlisted, he entered his occupation as "Prospector'. The finding of the ship means that Scotties family and the families of all those affected by this tragedy can take some comfort knowing the location that their loved one was lost has now been found.

You little beauty!

The word Bonsai has become generic for any forms of small potted plants. But the editor of the American Better Homes and Gardens magazine wrote ""the term should be reserved for plants that are grown in shallow containers following the precise tenets of bonsai pruning and training, resulting in an artful miniature replica of a full-grown tree in nature"

Bonsai trees have a strong association with Japan. But the art of growing miniature trees actually originated in ancient China. Japanese visitors took notice of the art form and on return adopted and promoted a version.

Members of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea were privileged to an address by *Victor Byrdy* the President of the Bonsai Society of Victoria a not for profit organisation focused on creating interest in and enjoyment of bonsai by both beginners and advanced growers. Victor brought a selection of his personal plants and explained in detail the type of plant and some specific details of the nurturing of each.

It happened that the Club was celebrating its 22nd birthday. Victor joined in the singing of "happy birthday to us" and partook in some of the celebratory cake.

His opening address to us was the same as that used at any gathering of people unfamiliar with the art of Bonsai. Our members had a 100% fail which is in keeping with the normal percentage even at garden clubs. Two questions gave the indication of audience bonsai expertise. Those asked to stand if they ever owned a bonsai soon sat down when asked if they still had it.

Besides the common name and the botanical name of trees we can now describe them in their bonsai family. Words like, myogi, huki-zukuri or fukinagashi are now implanted on our memories. The latter is named because of the windswept style of the treated plant. Mr Byrdy told us to imagine this as a tree through which wind is blowing noting the main branches stay in position whilst the thin branches and leaves position themselves according to the direction of the wind.

Nurturing a bonsai is similar to that for a child or a pet. Bonsai plants are outdoor plants and will not survive an indoor environment. They must have fresh air and regular watering which in summer is vital. Fertilisers especially suitable for bonsai were shown and explained. The bonsai garden is reminiscent of a hospital acute care ward.

Any new plant purchased at a general retail garden suppliers need to be put on "life support". Victor explained that there is no surety that such plants have had proper nurturing. It is recommended that the plant be placed in a bucket of water for two or three weeks preferably in dappled shade. Having ownership of 800 trees this advice is from an expert.

Each of the plants that Mr Byrdy brought along was shown and the type and action required explained in full detail. The clump style refers to a multi-trunk style if three or more trunks are growing out of the ground from a single root base. This very much reminded some of the Australian Mallee where what often described as trunks are branches from the actual trunk that is underground.

The Bonsai Society of Victoria conducts Novice Programs for those interested in exploring this ancient art. Time allocated only allowed Mr Byrdy to give an abridged version of his normal address. But he still took time to fend questions.

Three things we learnt during this closing session:-

- You cannot miniaturise fruit or flowers. Victor grafted some different varieties of apples onto a bonsai stock. The plant produced a full sized Granny Smith apple which he ate for breakfast.
- ♦ As branches extend in length the leaves get bigger, hence the need to prune the branches regularly
- His maple tree, although a bonsai plant of some longevity needs an annual root pruning. Mr Byrdy indicated that between the last pruning [12 month] the tree on display grew roots that when unwound were close to three metres long.
- ♦ Seeking to find a collective noun for bonsai plants we found nearly 40 that describe trees but none specifically for Bonsai. Based on Mr Byrdy's collection lets opt for xylotheque or xylothek a special form of herbarium that consists of a collection of authenticated wood specimens.

Although not endorsing the Bonsai Society we would recommend a visit to their web site www.bonsaisocietyvictoria.com

If there was a way to bonsai time the meeting could have been extended, but sadly the convenor Teresa Carlin called a stop and thanked Victor on our behalf with a small token of appreciation

What do we do?

Wandong Fire Brigade responds to a range of emergency call outs in and around the Wandong and Heathcote Junction area as well as adjacent towns and can be called to anywhere in Victoria.

Who Can Join?

The minimum age to join CFA is 16 years (Under 18s need parental consent). People of all ages and backgrounds are welcome at Wandong.

Do I need to live close by?

Yes. Most operational members live less than a 5-minute drive from the fire station in Rail Street.

Will it cost anything to join?

No. All training and equipment is provided by CFA as required.

What Benefits will there be?

CFA fire fighters meet new friends, learn new skills, develop leadership and management skills and achieve personal goals, all whilst giving back to the community.

How much time do I have to commit?

Wandong trains on Wednesday nights. There is a brigade meeting once every 2 months. Firefighters are required to attend a certain number of training sessions each year and ongoing skills maintenance.

What will training involve?

Basic fire fighter training will include fire behaviour and suppression, map reading, radio communications, OH&S and vehicle and equipment training. From there you are only limited by your imagination!

Is it dangerous?

Safety is the highest priority throughout CFA. Whilst firefighting isn't without risk, you will be provided with the appropriate training to ensure your safety and the safety of those around you.





Support for Young Carers

Approximately 1 in 10 carers are under the age of 25, however many don't identify themselves as a young carer. This may be because family members, teachers and other service providers may not be familiar with the signs of being a young carer.

If you are aged 25 or under and care for someone, you may be a young carer.

Being a young carer can have a number of different challenges.

- You might find it hard to find the services and help you need to look after the person you care for.
- You might find it hard to do well at, or get to, school when you look after someone else.
- You might find it hard to make or keep friends, or to go out and socialize or have the time to do things that interest you.

Young carers often take on a range of different responsibilities, such as:

- shopping, cooking, cleaning, washing and household chores
- specific care tasks such as assisting with mobility, grooming, bathing, toileting
- support and monitoring of the family members needs
- managing financial issues property maintenance, paying bills, banking
- care for other siblings in the family
- liaising with service providers and health care professionals e.g. making appointments, discussing treatments and medications
- interpreting for family members where English is a second language, and looking after siblings who have a disability if a parent is unable to look after them because of their own health issues.

All young carers should be able to enjoy life and to reach their potential. Help for young carers is available through the Carer Gateway. Our dedicated young carer worker is ready to help.

Conditions have to be right! Windy conditions greatly increase the likelihood that your burn off may get out of control. Warn your neighbours beforehand that there will be smoke in the air. Never leave a burn-off unattended stay for its entire duration. If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately.

Winter is on the way and this month's fire safety snippet is on chimney fires.

Chimney Fires and your Flue

Should a fire occur in your chimney or flue pipe then remember a fire needs air to burn. Close all vents and doors as a priority. Use a dry chemical fire extinguisher and avoid the use of water. Extinguishing with water may burn you with steam, crack the glass in the firebox door or buckle metalwork. If you think the fire is out, then do not open the door for at least 30 minutes. Did you call the fire brigade? You should do so as soon as you realise you have a problem. Some fires occur where the flue pipe goes through the ceiling. This can happen if a qualified professional does not install the flue and heater. A ceiling fire is extremely dangerous and requires immediate evacuation from the house and for someone to call 000 ASAP.

Chimney fires can occur when a hot fire in your wood heater, wood stove or fireplace ignites a build-up of creosote. Creosote deposits accumulate in all types of chimneys - masonry, or metal, where wood burning appliances are vented. Creosote is combustible and if it burns in the chimney, the fire is extremely hot. Roaring like a freight train, a chimney fire can melt through even a well-built "safe" chimney or vent, setting the building on fire.

Creosote is a black, oily wood-tar condensate that forms in chimneys over fireplaces or woodstoves; it forms inside of chimneys and flues when burning wood in fireplaces and woodstoves. Creosote tar, a natural by-product of burning wood is carried into the chimney as a vapour in the smoke. The creosote tar vapour condenses as a liquid on to the cooler chimney sides as smoke passes up the chimney and flue. A long low-smouldering wood fire produces more creosote than a hotter faster-burning wood fire. That is because burning wood at a lower temperature result in an incomplete combustion of the wood itself. As the creosote deposits cool, they harden to a shiny black coating that can be difficult to remove especially if the creosote deposits are left over an extended period.

Creosote will continue to accumulate on chimney surfaces until it is removed. A chimney cap not only prevents rain from entering (and possibly damaging) the chimney, but it also improves draft and prevents downdrafts - conditions that can increase the rate of creosote formation. Creosote deposits can be removed by using a stiff chimney brush if the deposits are sooty in character. This is the easiest and best condition to handle. Creosote deposits that are glazed and hard on the chimney walls can be difficult to remove. A powered mechanical brush maybe required in this situation.

Chimney fires can happen without you noticing it and can cause significant damage. Prevention and cleaning of the chimney is the answer. Prevent the creosote building up by burning dry wood only. Ideally, wood should be cut, split and dried a year before burning. It is desirable to burn small hot fires as opposed to large smoky ones. This will help reduce creosote build-up. A build-up of creosote that is between 3mm to 6mm is considered a hazard that should be removed. Chimneysweeper brushes are available from your hardware store or wood heater specialist. Wood heater specialists often provide maintenance services for your wood heater.





Vacations - Without The Dog! - (Options to consider)

Going on holiday, but what to do with your dog? There are different options so do some research and you can avoid any pitfalls. Remember the objective is to find what works best for you and your dog.

DAB (Domestic Animal Business License): State Govt regulations require that those being paid to care for dogs must have a 'DAB' - These regulations are for the safety and welfare of your dog and require annual inspections and renewals. Boarding Kennels AND even those who take dogs into Home Boarding must have this DAB with their local council and show a certificate.

Option 1 - Personal Friends and Relatives - DAB not required

Positives: This is a great option if your friends know and enjoy the company of your dog. Usually you provide the food and bedding and NO real cost, just remember you might have to return the favour when they go away.

Negatives: Ensure your friends will have similar house boundaries so your dog doesn't become a problem for them nor develop bad habits to bring home... **Warnings:** Also you need to be sure that your dog is comfortable with these friends and make sure they have good fencing that will keep your dog safe and secure.

Option 2 - House Sitter (live in or visiting) - DAB not required

Positives: This is a great option if you are away for extended periods as not only can they exercise the dog, but they keep the house secure and can water the garden. Sometimes these Sitters will stay in the house, some will visit just to feed the dog. Often a paid service or perhaps students who get free accommodation in exchange.

Negatives: If you don't know sitters personally then make sure they have police checks and recommendations perhaps from previous clients. Warnings: Ensure you have written agreement so all concerned understand boundaries, such as wanting to have parties or use of vehicles. Also state terms of who pays what.

Option 3 - Commercial Boarding Kennel - Must have DAB (Domestic Animal Business Licence)

Positives: Commercial kennels are set up with secure fencing and their staff should understand how to work with varied dog behaviours. Kennels can vary greatly but dogs are given a regular routine which will often help even the most anxious dogs settle. These kennels are also subject to annual inspection from the local councils to ensure they meet the State Government standards.

Negatives: Can be expensive (from \$40-\$80 per day). Even **if** a kennel charges a premium price this does not mean this is a better choice for your dog. Many of the big commercial kennels now operate in industrial settings and space is at a premium so the pens can be very small. Kennel staff can be fairly low paid and hence have a turnover, some may not have the experience to deal with dogs with issues and this can make a kennel stay quite stressful for your dog. **Warnings:** Dogs often don't want cuddles from strangers nor do they care about doona's and TV's. Owners should look past the slick website and fancy looking reception area - ask to see the full facility where your dog is actually staying (not just the premium pens) and check what is the dogs daily routine.

Option 4 - Home Boarding - Must have DAB (Domestic Animal Business Licence)

Often these names appear on local Facebook pages or on website such as 'Madpaws' - However it is important to know that these online marketing sites do not visit and inspect the facilities to ensure they meet the standards.

Positives: Local families are able to Host for **Up to 2 dogs** (from the same household) in their homes. Costs can run from around \$35-\$60 per day. Dogs get to live in the house and backyard with the host family and can be great for dogs who are not used to being away from their own family.

Negatives: You must ensure they have their DAB and not just say they are covered under the online website - They should have their DAB with their local council and experienced with dogs. Often the host will have the best intentions but do they know how to deal with any health or behaviour problems? **Warnings:** You should ensure the host has a safe place to house the dog when they are out. It is very important your dog is not able to climb fences nor that any visitors to the house do not end up leaving gates open or put the dog under stress.

For the welfare of your dog - choose Carefully!




Pedestrians and e-Scooters

Strict trial road safety rules apply to both commercial and private e-scooters.

Victoria totally prohibits e-scooters on footpaths and riders who violate this rule will be subject to penalties. The evidence gathered during the e-scooter trials highlight the safety risks when riders do not follow safety-based rules. You can legally ride an e-scooter in Victoria but the following conditions apply:

- You ride on shared-use paths and roads up to and including 60km/h;
- You are at least 16 years old;
- You wear a properly fitted approved bicycle helmet;
- You do not travel more than 20km/h
- You do not use your mobile phone;
- · You do not ride while intoxicated; and
- You do not carry a passenger.



In order for pedestrians to be safer, we recommend pedestrians:

- · Always keep an eye out for e-scooters when exiting a building; and
- Check for e-scooters as well as all other hazards before crossing a shared path, bicycle lane or a road.

All devices that use lithium-ion batteries pose a potential fire risk. E-scooters should be charged and stored away from walk ways, especially ones used in case of emergency, and used batteries should be disposed of safely. The battery of an e-scooter which may have been damaged in an accident should be disposed of immediately.

Pedestrians have road laws which apply in Victoria. These apply to crossing the road, walking along a road where there is no pavement, etc. Under the road rules, pedestrians include people on foot, on wheeled devices such as skateboards, rollerblades, wheel chairs & motorised mobility devices, and anyone pushing a bicycle.

Pedestrians must not:

- Cross the road if they are facing an amber or red light;
- Cross the road within 20 metres of a pedestrian crossing – they must use the crossing;
- Cross a railway level crossing when it is not allowed;
- Cause a traffic hazard by moving into the path of a driver; and
- Walk along a path which is for bicycles and other wheeled devices.

Pedestrians must:

- Use the shortest or most direct way to cross a road:
- Cross to the nearest edge of the road after getting off a tram; and
- Give way to vehicles at roundabouts or in a shared zone where the road is shared by vehicles and pedestrians.

Penalties apply when pedestrians break these rules.
