


(I think God's got more to do than tease his people with ideas like that!) But it's a good question to ask when our time comes.

GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

August already, where has the time gone? If you haven't finished the three applications of potash on your fruit trees, roses, hydrangeas and any other Spring flowering plant, this is the month to complete that task and if we get some rain you won't need to water it in. Daphne's are still looking beautiful and don't they smell so good. Keep the fortnightly liquid fertilising up until they drop their flowers and then it's time to prune them. You can take cuttings and using a root hormone gel or powder, pop the cuttings into a good quality potting mix, possibly a seed raising mix might do the job. Peg layering can work with Daphne as well. Find a low growing branch quite close to the ground, make a cut halfway through the branch at a node and apply rooting gel or powder into the cut. Remove some soil/potting mix directly below that cut and gently place the cut branch down into that hollow and keep it there with a peg, forked branch, tent peg or anything that will keep it down into the soil. Keep it moist but not wet and fingers crossed, over time, it will push down roots, then it can be cut from the main plant. If you haven't pruned back your fruit trees yet, try to get them done very soon, in the first part of the month. Maintain an open centre and prune off unhealthy branches, wayward branches that cross over other branches and any growth coming from around the base of the trunk, these may well be suckers from damaged roots of the plant, close to the surface. Keep in mind that the taller our fruit trees grow the harder it can be to retrieve the fruit from them. You may even want to take cuttings from the fruit trees, kids love to be in the garden so why not let them stick some of the cuttings in for fun. They will bear fruit but perhaps not in abundance! Bulbs such as Daffodils, Freesia's and Jonguils will still be flowering so get the liquid fertiliser on to them for the plant to store once again, for next year's growth and don't forget the lovely Violets, (both white & purple) sweet perfume and really hardy. Camellias are looking lovely now, and



the Olinda Camelia & Rhododendron gardens are worth a visit. Fertilise them with Dynamic lifter, or whatever you choose, and you can use fertiliser specific for Camelias, Rhododendrons and Azaleas if you prefer as you can for citrus plants, native plants etc. Weeds are still growing of course and while the soil is soft, they are easier to pull out but time is our enemy, we finish weeding and it's time to start again. If you have deciduous plants, they will be waking up from their Winter sleep and need to be fertilised so they can comfortably push new growth and don't experience any setback. The lush green and yellow leaves of the Ash trees, the red and purple of the Cotinus and the stunning Maples, beautiful deciduous plants, waking up after their Winter sleep, are bursting into Spring to share their stunning colours. Enjoy our last month of Winter. Happy Planting.



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Darraweit Guim Primary School News







WANDONG - INLAND RAIL DESIGN UPDATE

Inland Rail is Australia's largest freight rail project. It will transform the way we move freight around the country by allowing double-stacked freight trains to travel between Melbourne and Brisbane via regional Victoria and New South Wales.

In Wandong we will be replacing the Broadford-Wandong Road bridge with a newer, safer but higher bridge to the north of the existing structure. The new bridge will provide clearance for taller double-stacked freight trains to pass underneath.

It is clear the Wandong and Heathcote-Junction community is passionate about how Inland Rail is delivered. We thank you for waiting patiently for an updated design.

Through community feedback, ARTC has heard a desire for improved connectivity, road and pedestrian safety and the importance of maintaining access during construction. We've also heard the need to minimise impacts to private property, local heritage sites and Pickett Walk, including the community-planted mature pin-oak and she-oaks trees.

We have been working hard to deliver a safe and compliant design that meets community expectations, incorporating community feedback where possible. We are now ready to share our 'Reference Design' and look forward to hearing from you to gather your thoughts and feedback that will assist us to further refine the design.

YOU, THE A.R.T.C. AND THAT NEW WANDONG BRIDGE HAVE YOU CHECKED IT OUT YET?.

Have you stopped in at the A.R.T.C. shopfront at Wandong Plaza to see what damage and disruption will be caused by the new bridge that will be built at the northern end of Rail Street, Wandong?

We have been promised a viewing of the plans for this construction by mid-August, including new road levels, new speed limits, and proposed temporary road closures. In speaking with many in our town it seems that most do not think that it will cause them much interruption during the eighteen months to two years that this job will take to complete.

I would like to lay out some facts that may disturb you about just how affected our town will be over that period.

- 1. During construction we will have many large trucks coming and going from the site, causing chaos around the existing bridge.
- 2. There will be road closures on both sides of the bridge as the road levels will need to be raised from about a meter and a half on the Epping Kilmore Road and on Rail Street the height will have to be raised by more than two meters.
- 3. As part of the project the contractors will be building a new roundabout some twenty meters north of the existing bridge. That roundabout will be approximately five meters above the current road level and linked to Rail St with one huge pile of dirt.
- 4. During construction it is estimated there will be more than four hundred thousand cubic meters of fill needed to form the new roundabout. All of this fill will need to be trucked in and will acquaint to more than sixteen thousand truck and trailer loads of fill coming in through the town. That will be about ten or twelve of these monsters every day coming on to site. By the time they finish all that cartage we will need a new bridge.
- 5. Then there is the problems of the dust and noise created by such a huge project. For those living close to the site it will be somewhat difficult, but this project will affect all of us who live in and around Wandong. So please make the effort and call in and see just what their plans are for our town. We cannot stop the job, but with enough complaints and comments we can try and keep disruption and chaos to a minimum.

This successful funding agreement is part of the Country Football Netball Program. State Government will be contributing \$195,000 to the \$260,000 LB Davern Drainage Upgrade project with Council contributing the remaining \$65,000.

The project will see the installation of lateral drainage to eliminate the current ponding/flooding of water in key sections of the oval and a reshape of both goal square areas.

THE WANDONG WAR MEMORIAL CAR PARK



We have long advocated for the large open drain along the west side of the Epping Kilmore Road at the Wandong war memorial car park to be placed underground to enable easier use of the car park. The cable fencing along the roadside should be removed to enable angle parking from the road. This busy car park constantly needs repairs to fix huge holes that develop. The car park (or at least the entry) could have been sealed for the cost of the constant repairs. This is the busiest roadside toilet stop in Mitchell Shire and continues to be ignored by Mitchell Shire. A request to the CEO Mitchell Shire to divert Davern Reserve drainage savings to the carpark has as usual been met with total negativity and refusal by the CEO. It appears one needs to be the loudest and have the numbers to be recognised as a priority by this Council so please look for our petition that will be circulated shortly.

The Community Group has recognized the very popular use of the picnic table at the Wandong War Memorial carpark and has purchased and installed a second table at this position and another table in the Lions Park. If we wanted the Council to do this it would have needed an Act of Parliament and it might occur in a years time. However 20 new picnic tables were installed in Wallan last year. When will our Shire grasp the fact that Wandong is a key gateway to the Shire?

How disappointing it is to see our town buildings, and even our new mural in the Plaza, being graffitied. We have removed the graffiti from the mural and asked Mitchell Shire to remove the graffiti from the railway pedestrian bridge pylons and request businesses to remove graffiti from their buildings.

Hello again. Last month we had a quick overview of the Carer Gateway and listed the supports that are available to you as a carer. This month I would like to focus on Carer Support & Planning - a very important part to assisting carers to access the supports they need. All too often carers put their own needs secondary to those of the person they care for. It is important that you as a carer prioritise your needs which in turn supports to continue in your caring role. The Carer Gateway has the needs of the carer as the main priority - all assistance that is provided through the Carer Gateway has the carer firmly at the heart of that support.

Carer Support & Planning is a process that has two main stages:

- 1. Understanding the carers needs
- 2. Support Planning

Through a guided conversation our carer support and planning staff work with each carer to understand their individual priorities. This conversation focuses on several key areas including: the carers health; the caring role; managing at home; how you are feeling; and how the caring role is impacting on your work / study / volunteering / social activities.

Once a carers priorities have been identified our carer support and planning team provide short term support to carers to help them navigate, coordinate and access the right services.

Support is tailored to your needs – we can help you connect with services that support both your needs and well-being.

We will keep in touch regularly and work with you to ensure your needs are being met, the support is sustainable and to check in on your well-being.



Ladder Safety at Home

Do you need to unblock the gutters? Quick job? If you are over 50 then it is now considered not a job for you. It is a high-risk task regardless of your age.

Whatever your age, you need to plan and carry out a few checks before your "run" up the ladder. It should be a two-person task, ideally someone holding the ladder for you.

Falls from ladders are a common cause of serious injury at home. It is the biggest cause of serious injuries at home to men; the following information is a guide to safe use of ladders-

- Ladders should be inspected and maintained before use
- If you consider the job risky, then consult a professional or consider the use of a mobile scaffold or elevated work platform
- Always check for overhead powerlines or electrical and radiation hazards before attempting to set up a ladder
- Do not use a ladder in a doorway or driveway unless the area has been blocked off to access
- Ensure that the ladder is set up on a firm surface and placed at a safe angle
- Secure either the base and/or top of the ladder to prevent it from moving. Consider getting someone to hold the base of the ladder
- Always maintain three points of contact with the ladder i.e. two feet and one hand or two hands and one foot
- Face the ladder when climbing up or down
- Use the ladder runs to grip the ladder and not the sides of the ladder
- Do not over stretch when using the ladder
- Avoid climbing or descending the ladder whilst carrying anything in your hands- consider rope and bucket instead
- Keep your feet free from mud, grease or other slippery material
- Do not stand higher than the tread or run indicated on the ladder as the highest standing level
- A ladder used for access to a roof must extend at least one metre above the level where a person exits the ladder
- Use a ladder for what it was designed for. They are not to be used as a support for work platforms such as planks
- If you access the roof often then consider fitting a commercial ladder point, a bracket that is permanently fitted to the roof to prevent the ladder from moving and allows the ladder to be tied off.

A missing landmark

Until the new century arrived and suburbia, like lava from a volcano, spread toward the farmlands approaching the thirty kilometre radius mark from Melbourne the major shopping hub was at Epping.

Many of the members of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea used to traverse High Street and pass the prominent church on the corner of Lehmanns Road near where the suburb of Wollert commences. Not long into the new millennium the church was decommissioned and soon deteriorated.

We are talking about the former Wollert Methodist Church, officially founded within the Preston and Heidelberg Circuit in 1878, after a Wesleyan Methodist congregation had formed in 1859. It later became Uniting Church until closure in 2006.

Much construction of buildings and roadworks in the area took travellers attention for the next ten plus years and the church was "just there". Suddenly something was happening and soon the church was gone and the land was vacant. Major Roads acquired the Church site as part of the Epping Road Upgrade and preserved the building due to its significance to the local community.

Together with the City of Whittlesea and Working Heritage Major Roads set in motion plans to protect and preserve the Church's historic and social value. These plans culminated in May of 2022 when the building was moved and rebuilt at Carome Homestead in Mernda. Now open to the public, the church will be managed by Working Heritage and again become a hub for the community to use – for generations to come.

Much has already been published about the project, but not many have had a personal insight into the planning and logistics so we invited Kieran Davis (pictured) Cultural and Heritage Adviser at Working Heritage to join with members and advise how it all came to a successful conclusion.

The Working Heritage Incorporated Committee of Management (Working Heritage) conserves and manages heritage properties on Crown land on behalf of the State of Victoria. Working Heritage has been appointed to manage 16 sites across Victoria, undertaking expert conservation and adaptation works so the community can benefit from these revitalised historic buildings and sites.

A montage of photographs showing the various sites that are mainly in towns close to Melbourne, except for the Warracknabeal Court House was enlightening showing a pictorial history of architecture.

Kieran showed a video detailing the dismantling and relocation of the church. He explained the somewhat difficult undertaking due to the age and materials used in the original and subsequent construction. The new home for the church is, as mentioned, now at Carome Homestead a site managed by Working Heritage

Two managed sites are located within the Whittlesea council's boundaries and again show the historical connection that the Plenty Valley has to Victoria's establishment. They are Carome Homestead and Farm Vigano'

Carome Homestead dates from 1840 but Farm Vigano' did not eventuate until 1934 when the well-known and respected restaurateur Mario Vigano' purchased the property and built the family retreat. In its day Farm Vigano' was the place where "A List Members" congregated to foster business and personal relationships. The property, with house, farm buildings, and designed landscape, provides the last tangible physical association with Mario and Maria Teresa Vigano', and is able to demonstrate their remarkable contribution to cuisine, hospitality, culture and the arts.

Whilst the restaurant and reception is privately operated the farm has 15 acres for Community Use and provides access to the Plenty Valley Gorge. The orchard has over 500 fruit trees that provide seasonal fruit for the Chefs at the restaurant. But Kieran advised that the public are allowed to pick some for their own consumption.

Carome Homestead was the site where Victoria's [then NSW] first flour mills were established in 1840. The Plenty River

provided the power for the water wheel but it was not highly productive. Records indicate it ground five [5] bushels an hour. A bushel of wheat is given as 60 lb which when milled gives about 42 lb of flour. To save readers taxing their memory or reaching for a calculator in today's terms that would equal about 50 2kg packs of plain flour.

The mill's operation was curtailed when the Yan Yean Reservoir was developed and the river flow slowed. The owner received six hundred pound compensation and the mill closed. The site is preserved and plans to interpret the site are currently underway.

The Wollert Church now stands sparking white and proud in the grounds of Carome Homestead and much discussion is being held about future use. Working Heritage is currently running a survey to gauge the level of interest from the community in using this building. The <u>link</u> closes on 31st August 2023.

Neighbourhood Watch Let's watch out for each other South Mitchell

Being Safe and Connected

At Neighbourhood Watch, we believe a connected community is a safer community. And at the heart of every connected community are neigbours like you and us.

Knowing your neighbours will help you feel safer, boost your mental health and wellbeing and improve your lifestyle. It doesn't mean you have to live in each other's pockets, but that you can give each other a wave and a



smile and feel comfortable enough to ask for or offer help when required.

Being a good neighbour can be very simple if you say hi and introduce yourself. This may lead to having them over for a cuppa or barbecue. If people find you friendly, helpful, considerate and approachable, they're more likely to respond in the same way. Simple gestures such as mowing their nature strip, bringing their rubbish bin in, or offering them excess vegies from your vegie patch can foster great neighbourly relations.

On a farm, your kind gestures might include keeping an eye out for strangers, loaning the farm equipment or help out on a task if an extra pair of hands is required. Farms can be easy targets as they are often isolated and access to rear paddocks is unseen. Thefts from farms have enormous social and economic impacts. It can be costly, disruptive and mentally straining.

Neighbourhood Watch Victoria has developed a new app 'How safe is your farm?' This app goes through the different areas of safety on a farm so you can evaluate your strengths and weakness, and make suggestions on what you could do better to keep your family, neighbours and equipment safer on your farm.

Free Smoke Detectors

Our Country Fire Authority (CFA) conducts free smoke alarm assessments and replacements in our community. The program is important in order to spread fire safety awareness throughout our shire.

The CFA recommends that you install a smoke detector between each sleeping area and the rest of your home. If you live in a house with more than one level, then install a smoke detector on each level.

Ideally, all smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one alarm goes off, all smoke detectors will sound. This is not always possible, especially in older homes where battery smoke alarms are fitted, but insist on it with new homes. All smoke detectors should have their batteries checked every month. This is done by pushing the test button. Dust the alarm and change the battery at least once a year.

The location of the smoke alarm also matters. Avoid locations where there is a nearby window, door or even an air ducts as there could be a draft. Dead air spaces are just as problematic as the air won't reach the smoke detector. Avoid placing them too close to the ceiling / wall junction or between exposed beams.

House fires occur more frequently during the winter months, and making sure you go in to winter with a working smoke alarm makes good sense. If you have a hard-wired smoke alarm, these still have a battery as a back-up and the battery needs to be changed as well.

If you are physically restricted, or elderly, and have no one to help you, then contact your local CFA station who will arrange someone to come out to assist you with fitting a new smoke alarm.

A Common Question : When is the best time to get a 2nd Dog...!!! By Anne Zelvys IACP-CDT

Most dogs love the company of other dogs. So just like with our human race, dogs are highly social beings and love being around others. This is perhaps why dogs are also happy to hang out with members of our human community.

There can be many advantages in having more than one dog but it is just about understanding the way dogs work to make sure this works.....

- 1. Families may feel they are having so much fun with their first dog that they can't wait to get another puppy.
- 2. Often when your pup gets to about 6-7 months old, the humans get a bit frustrated and perhaps not spending as much time with the pup. Now pup gets overly excited, often silly and difficult to 'train'.
- 3. Owners interpret pup's anxieties, extra energy and attention seeking, as a sign of loneliness!.... Hence they feel the need to get him a friend.

There can be huge disadvantages with how families handle this situations and the problems experienced with the first pup then become worse and then you can end up with *Double Trouble*.



Consideration: Prepare for the added cost ?

- Feeding costs will more than double... Pups will often eat more thru their first year than they ever will as an adult.
 When your family goes on holidays you might require a kennel or pet sitter which requires fees of around \$300 per dog per week. This can eat considerably into your holiday budget.
- 3. Vet bills WILL increase even just for the everyday procedures, let alone the fact that in their first year, your pup has a greater chance of having an illness or injury. Pups can also be prone to swallowing foreign items which can require expensive operations.

Consideration : As a Trainer and Breeder, I see the issues when the dogs are too close in age

- 1. Both can become very co-dependant on each other if one is not around then the other will start to fret.
- 2. Dogs become so fixated with each other to the detriment on their relationship with their humans.
- 3. It is more difficult for each dog to develop independent social skills with the outside world.
- 4. They may even become competitive with each other over toys, food and time with the humans.

Maturity - Dogs do not mature mentally until they are 21/2 or 3 years old.

Once your dog is 12-18 months old you might feel as if they are all grown up - So you get another pup... however when the new pup is around 6 months old the young adult who is still lacking confidence and experience, now reverts to their teenage self - and just like with humans kids, two rowdy, moody teenagers is never a fun living arrangement.

Perhaps the biggest issue is that a new pup can hinder both the dogs ability to develop a solid mature bond with their human family. Developing this bond takes time and effort and us working with dogs thru all the different stages of their maturity.

Recommendation : We have dogs at least 21/2 years apart and even better to have 3 years apart.

Once your first dog is well established in the home they are better able to share... Your dog will also have the maturity to help guide the new pup to have good manners around the house.

Also families need to spend to socialise the new pup independently from the older dog. Taking them to visit friends or the dog park, learning how to cope with children etc... All WITHOUT the older dog for the pup to rely on. Plus is very important for the puppy to learn to stay home alone while you take your first dog out for some quality one on one time.

A multi dog household is a great place provided you have planned well to make this work, Otherwise your house could become one of those chaotic dog homes that friends might avoid visiting.....
