#### MITCHELL SHIRE - SWORN TO SECRECY

On Wednesday 26th February, members of the Wandong Heathcote Junction Community Group and the Wandong History Group met with officers from A.R.T.C., John Holand Constructions and the Mitchell Shire Council to comment on the latest plans. At all opportunities over the past three years, and particularly responding at ARTC consultation sessions, the WHJCG and WHG have asked for the footpath from Rail Street to the Wandong Broadford Road be kept on the west side of these streets.

This can be achieved by going under the proposed new road bridge but the latest plans still have a footpath around the roundabout with access by pedestrian crossings on Rail Street and the Wandong Broadford Road. It is bad enough that ARTC and John Holland are not listening to the community but we find Mitchell Shire in its secret meetings with them have also not taken into account the community wishes and the best outcome for Wandong. One might assume Mitchell Shire was there to communicate with and advocate for the community but according to Mitchell Shire officers at the meeting this was not possible because it had been, wait for it, "SWORN TO SECRECY". Unbelievable.



Another task taken on by the Wandong Heathcote Junction Community Group was to paint the furniture in the Wandong Bushfire Memorial Park and the Travellers Rest gazebo at the railway station car park because Mitchell Shire has advised "it is now policy to not paint or stain this furniture and it will now be left to become a raw timber state".

After years of campaigning Mitchell Shire for the revamp of the Wandong bushfire park car park, four weeks ago we have been advised that the plan will be produced within six weeks. Hopefully we will get a say in the design and it will be displayed to the community for comment. A discussion with a Mitchell Shire Officer some weeks ago presented some concerns when some important aspects of the plan seemed to be overlooked.


Mitchell Shire has received 12 submissions for a replacement artwork in the Lions Park adjacent to the Wandong railway station car park. We were involved in the evaluations and a decision will be announced shortly with a view of the project being completed by May 2025. The WHJCG and the Wandong History Group, have favoured the submissions that display our history, but a more contemporary artwork appears to have been selected. If that is the case the WHJCG will pursue other avenues to implement a history based artwork on Pickett Walk.






The grate for the drain in Rail Street around the corner from Affleck Street continues to cause a problem. It is regularly

blocked with mud, leaves, etc causing water to cross Rail Street at road level. Despite asking Mitchell Shire to fix the problem, the only time that the mud, etc is removed from the grate is when the WHJCG removes it.

The WHJCG, Wandong History Group has had a meeting with ARTC, John Holland and Mitchell Shire officers regarding the rail bridge project, Pickett Walk, etc. We are not happy about the footpath proposed to go around the east side of the roundabout and including two pedestrian crossings, instead of remaining on the west side of the road and going under the bridge. ARTC and John Holland have agreed to have the responsible engineer meet withus to advise the rationale behind its decision. We are running another BBQ for ARTC on Saturday 15th March where they will answer any questions about the project.

#### Maybe we have thrown out the Bible with the bathwater! Part 1

Somebody was once heard to say that it's a pity the Bible has to do with religion otherwise it would be compulsory study material in more schools and colleges! Probably the most important collection of writings in literature history, yet it is hardly mentioned in any modern school study lists. The concepts, ideas, suggestions and examples in the books seem to have the answer to a complete list of our present problems and concerns.

In no other writings do we find such insight, understanding, support and direction for living in our present times. Where indeed do we find encouragement like 'Peace I leave with you, My peace I give unto you. not the type of peace the world offers' let not your heart be troubled neither let it be afraid.' How about that? There's some modern insight! Not as the world dishes up, hey! found much peace by watching T.V. or reading the papers lately? kids how about any nightmares after playing some of those games that the experts assure us that they have no lasting influence on our behaviour.

How about a world in which last nights rape, house break-ins or assaults did not happen? A world where your kids could still play in the park till late! A place where wars between countries, families and neighbours did not start through selfish demands, where bullying was not heard of, where disagreements were settled amicably. Too much to expect! O.K. but what a vision, what a concept to aim for, if not in our public life but to aim for in our private aspirations.

Because of the way the community is now interpreting privacy laws, freedom laws and some strange politically correct suggestions I would grab a Bible while they can be still obtained legally and look for a road map through the confusion. They say health, wealth and sleep have to be interrupted to be appreciated, so better not wait till owning a Bible is also threatened!

To quote John Blanchard (author of "Does God Believe in Atheists) the Bible has a great deal to say about marriage, alcoholism, substance abuse, stress and depression, it gives direction about family life, business management, social justice, pointing the way to love, joy, peace, patience (road rage) gentleness and self-control. That will do for now!

Paul McCartney wrote over 100 songs a commendable effort on his part! Inspired no doubt by his observations of life as he experienced it and now the subject of much discussion by his followers. Some of the earlier parts of the Bible may need parental guidance but things were different in earlier times. Zipp forward about 2/3rds through the books and find lots of stories, insights, warnings and astute observations into modern life.

# GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

Well, it's March again and we are now into Autumn. Summer was quite harsh, and it was an uphill battle to keep our plants watered, and we hoped they would survive the hot drying winds, very low rainfall and the battle we have with wildlife eating the plants because they're hungry for feed. Autumn is a really lovely time of year, (and it will be better when the rain comes), not only can we sleep easier with cooler weather, but we can get out into the garden and get some much-needed work done. Cooler weather enables us to prune any plants that are a bit leggy, overshadowing other plants, needing a tidy up and/ to get rid of damaged branches. If it hasn't rained when you want to prune ensure you have watered and applied Seasol to the plant in question, this will reduce stress to the plant particularly moisture loss from the branches that are cut. Be aware that if you have Autumn flowering plants such as Camellias you will need to wait until they have finished flowering to prune however, Spring flowering Camellias can be pruned but don't leave it late in Autumn to do so as it may interfere with their flowering. A good rule of thumb is to prune after flowering, just before plants push new growth. Weeds can be removed now and even though it is only Autumn this is an excellent time to prepare garden beds and around the base of plants for absorption of moisture via watering or that much needed rain. It's all about ensuring our gardens can successfully use every drop of water they get to maintain strong growth. As you weed, apply a wetting agent and if you use the liquid Seasol wetting agent (brown bottle), ensure it doesn't get onto the foliage. This will assist in moisture being absorbed by the soil, top dress with well-rotted cow manure and follow up with mulch. If you have soapy water this can be applied to the soil as well to help any moisture, be able to penetrate into the soil but take care what soap you are using and the amount in the water as too much may be harmful. Some soils may be extremely hard after the Summer we have just



experienced. If your soil is not absorbing water you may need to break the top crust of the soil very lightly to allow the water to seep in, taking care not to dig too deep around plants as this may damage the roots of the plants and encourage suckers to develop, keeping in mind there are some plants that are shallow rooted, such as Azaleas, Rhododendrons and Camellias. Apply Gypsum in addition to the wetting agent and well rotted cow manure and water in well. Some of the deciduous plants are colouring and dropping their leaves, they are stressed, and this is their way of coping with dry weather. Take note that their branches are still supple, and they don't start to crinkle lengthways, this indicates that the plant is really suffering, and it hasn't had enough moisture. If this happens the plant will require some TLC, soak it really well and follow up with a weekly solution of Seasol. Be diligent and have a fantastic March.

## **CLONBINANE C.F.A.**



Summer may have officially ended but our Fire Danger Period (FDP) is far from over. Until significant rainfall has occurred our Fire Danger Period will continue (No official end date has been determined) which means that we all must remain vigilant when it comes to fires.

Whilst we are trained to fight fires it is everyone's responsibility to help prevent them from occurring. Since the FDP commenced in November until the end of February Clonbinane CFA has responded to 35 incidents.

Some of these incidents were started by angle grinders and welders. The use of this equipment is BANNED on days of Total Fire Ban, and there are significant measures to be followed on other days.

If possible, leave these types of works until the middle of winter when it should be safer.

If caught completing hot work and not following the guidelines you can face heavy penalties including fines of up to \$47,421 and potentially up to two years in jail whilst also being legally and financially responsible for any damage your hot work started.

There are also legal requirements for the declared Fire Danger Period with restrictions and guidelines on the use of:

BBQ's, Chainsaws, Lawn Mowers, Grass Trimmers, Driving of vehicles in vegetation, Campfires, Wildlife Scare Guns etc



#### A change in name

Southern Cross Gold has merged with Mawson Gold Ltd of Canada to become Southern Cross Gold Consolidated (SXGC) Ltd, now dual-listed on the Australian Securities Exchange and Toronto Venture Exchange. While this Canadian listing broadens our access to global investors and expertise, our focus remains firmly in Victoria.

Most importantly, nothing changes on the ground. You'll see the same familiar faces with our existing local team leading our exploration activities.

We remain deeply committed to our community and we look forward to continuing this strong local presence and investment.

#### Working with Traditional Owners

SXGC continues to proactively engage with the Traditional Owners of the Sunday Creek area, the Taungurung Land and Waters Council (TLaWC).

We regularly work with TLaWC and ensure they provide important feedback into areas of our operations.

TLaWC recently joined us on site at the Sunday Creek Project to undertake a voluntary cultural heritage clearance. The clearances are undertaken ahead of exploration activity to ensure cultural heritage features in the area are identified and protected.

As our operations evolve, we look forward to finding new ways of working together.

#### Managing wombat mange

Did you know our wombat neighbours can suffer from mange? The skin disease is caused by parasitic mites and without treatment, mange is always fatal.

SCGC is working with volunteer-lead organisation Mange Management to assist affected wombats on our land. We're using the burrow flap method which delivers medication to the wombat's back as they enter and exit their burrows. Once a wombat is treated we continue to monitor their health.

#### **Exploration update**

SXGC has continued its exploration efforts with diamond drill rigs, currently collecting core samples from deep underground.

In addition to drilling, SXGC has installed seven groundwater monitoring bores. These bores will help gather important data on water levels and quality, ensuring that environmental factors are carefully managed throughout the project. Monitoring groundwater is an essential step in responsible exploration and will help protect water resources.

The team has also conducted a geophysical induced polarisation (IP) survey and a soil sampling program has been carried out to analyse surface materials.

SXGC remains committed to keeping the community informed as exploration continues. These activities will help guide future work and ensure that any potential development is carried out responsibly and with careful consideration of the local environment.

#### About soil sampling




Before drill rigs move into an area we sample the soil to understand the distribution of gold, antimony and other related minerals on the surface. It's a fast and low impact method of testing over a large area, causing minimal physical disturbance.

Our team first clears an area of 50cm x 50cm before digging a 40cm x 40cm hole and taking a 10-20cm soil sample. The small hole is then backfilled, and debris spread back over disturbed area. Each soil sample will be approximately 200-300g, or up to 3kg if the sample requires sieving back on site.

Our geologists use this information to infer what is happening below the surface and use it to plan our next drilling activities.

#### Yea exploration license application



SXGC recently applied for an exploration license EL008626 (shown above) southwest of Yea to allow us to explore for gold and antimony. This application is currently being considered by Earth Resources Regulation, the state government's regulator of exploration.

If the license is granted, an initial low impact exploration phase will commence. Low impact exploration activities can include geological mapping, soil and rock samples and geophysical surveys.

All SXGC's exploration activities adhere to, and are governed by, the Victorian Government's Code of Practice for Mineral Exploration or are subject to approval of an exploration work plan.

#### Kilmore District Hospital garden party



#### The Blue Lotus Water Garden

In Egyptian mythology, the Blue Lotus played a significant role in creation myths. The flower's daily cycle of opening with the sun and closing at dusk made it a symbol of the sun's journey, tying it to the solar deities Ra and Horus. This association with the sun and creation cemented the flower's spiritual importance. Despite its common name, the blue lotus is not a true lotus like the Nelumbo species.

The day tour organiser Alessandra Testa, of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea organised a tour to the Blue Lotus Water Garden at Yarra Junction. Released to wander and explore the members were soon spread around the 14 acres of water features. There are many ponds, waterfalls and fountains surpassed by two large lakes that are the drawcards.

Cochrane Lake named after visionary Geoff, who followed his dream and set up the Lotus Farm, is the largest lake in the garden holding over 11 million litres of water. It stretches 250m long and contains over 70 varieties of waterlily flowers creating a carpet of colour across the lakes surface. The lake also features a 225m walk through its middle, with 11 bridges including the famous Red Arched Bridge.

A feature of the display is the prized collection of Claude Monet's original waterlilies that he planted in his garden at Giverny in France. The famed painting is replicated in real life!

The gardens surrounding the lake also contain a plethora of perennial flowers and shade giving banana and Cocos palms. Often native water birds such as Giant Egrets, Water Hens, Spoon Bills, a platypus and numerous ducks are seen foraging for food or building nests.

Featured attractions include:

- **♦** The Giant Amazon Waterlilies,
- ♦ Kakadu Lagoon Native Waterlily display,
- ♦ Tropical World complex,
- ♦ Lotus Wetlands, Golden Lotus display,

By far and away the Giant Amazon waterlily will remain in visitors' memories and perhaps even in nightmares. Nightmares may be exacerbated for those who visited *carnivorous kingdom*!

The Victoria Cruziana is native to the subtropical regions of South America. It produces very large lily pads that reach 1.4 – 1.8 metres in diameter. So big, they can hold the weight of a child or small adult. The leaves (lily pads) feature a smooth green top with high sides. However, the underside of leaves and stalks are covered in large razor-

sharp spines that can seriously injure a human! Management does not allow visitors to touch these plants.

After corralling the coach load of hungry members, Allesandra took us to the Bistro at the Upper Yarra RSL where a choice of roast lamb or grilled fish was served. Only the

one desert was available but none were refused. Time came to load up and meander through the upper and middle Yarra regions until the Kinglake turn arrived and Whittlesea was soon reached. Folks headed to their homes for the weekend and were to reassemble on Monday 3 March 2025 for the Annual General meeting.

#### Micro-Management ... Bad for Kids, Bad for Dogs....

Many of us may have even been guilty of Micro-Management at some time or other. We see this in many and varied situations. Often a workplace environment, at the school drop off and particularly at family events like weddings. When this over-management happens with our kids or dogs we can refer to this as Helicopter Parenting and is perhaps one of the worst parenting traits, as the child/dog have their mental growth stunted.

**Helicopter Parenting** often starts out with the humans thinking they are trying to make the best of a bad situation, but it easily becomes our habit of dealing with many events. Consider the scenario we often see at the supermarket; Some kid whinging/nagging and the mum keeps apologising to the kid, "It's okay dear we won't be long", or "Settle down darling", or worse, they hand the kid a chocolate to keep him quiet, but lolly finished and kid starts again. Makes you want to scream "BAD PARENT" (you don't as it's not your business).

As a Trainer, that is how I feel every time I go to a Vet Clinic or a Dog Park... I see dogs *Excited, Anxious, Shrinking back, Lunging, Jumping on Furniture....* and owners holding the dog on a short lead, patting the dog trying to calm the dog... "It's okay we won't be long - Sit, Sit, mummy's here" etc... using nervous worried tones. It makes me want to yell - "BAD HUMAN"... (but I don't as it's not my business...)

The problem with micro-managing is that if you fall into that trap, you will feel the need to compensate for the entire life of the dog. In truth, the parent's job is to teach the dog and kids how to cope with the big world out there. Now at this point, I will stop talking about human children as I have no desire to lecture on parenting and just talk about how to change things for your dog. So, start early and set your dog up for the rest of their life.

**Instinctive Response** - It is important to understand that when a dog is under stress they will resort to Fight or Flight... at this point this is NOT a teaching situation, instead we need to manage the situation (not micromanage) and wait until dog can settle and things calm down. This means we need

to build the dog's life experience to cope with a broad range of situations.

Common Example often seen at the Vets, perhaps the dog is very nervous and the stress level is heightened, particularly if the staff crowd and rush the dog during treatment. Food won't connect with the dog's brain. Trying to force food onto a dog under these situations, just creates more confusion and again dog can distrust your ability to guide him to a safe conclusion..... "BAD HUMAN".....



First - Stop patting the dog in an attempt to calm! When you take your dog out in public the dog needs to see that his 'parent' is calm and happy. Trying to reassure a dog when he is nervous is *madness...* they are a dog - they don't understand your human words... Instead they interpret that YOU are worried and scared and this makes the situation worse. They don't feel you can be relied on to help or guide them because you seem scared and they can interpret that you might run away any minute.... You are being ....."BAD HUMAN".

**Second - Stop trying to bribe the dog with food!** Trying to distract the dog with food/toy will NOT solve the immediate problem. The dog is already overwhelmed by the situation and can mentally shut down - they cannot think ... but the human keeps trying to push food in the dog's mouth because they read somewhere we must use rewards to teach our dog... However this is not a teaching situation, this is a dog just trying to cope with the here and now and hence is fixating on the problem in front of them.

**Third - Stop trying to verbally explain to the dog!** Humans love to prattle usually in an attempt to re-assure dogs but really the human is just trying to re-assure themselves. Honestly the dog doesn't understand WHAT on earth you are saying and all that chatter becomes *white noise* which again confuses the situation. Worse still your chatter also starts to make the humans around you feel more stressed, which the dog feels and reacts to.

**Next - Change the story! -** Consider the Vet Clinic example... Instead of the anticipation of stress, lets change the narrative for the dog: *Take the dog into the vet clinic perhaps every week, not for a consult, just in the waiting room. Perhaps weigh them on the scales, 3-4 minutes and leave, then go for a walk or run in the park so dog has a great time. After 4-5 visits dog and human have reduced the anticipation that a clinic is a stress place. Then reduce the frequency to fortnightly and by the third month you should see new behaviours form.* 

Your dog's behaviour is a reflection on you..!!

So the way you behave will determine how the dog behaves.

If you want to have a great dog then set a good example and don't be a ... " BAD HUMAN "



### WANDONG HISTORY GROUP

The group were pleased to host members of other local historical organisations to view the collection of maps donated to us by Peter and Pauline Bourke. A chance meeting at Bunnings resulted in the maps being donated to us after the old offices of Skehans were cleaned out and many boxes of old records trawled through.



After some sorting of the maps which varied greatly in condition, from very old fragile maps on hessian and linen to more modern paper maps the area covered included as far away as Alexandra, Eildon, and others closer to home, Kilmore, Wallan etc there were over 100 maps in the collection.

We expect that as we get to have a more in depth look at what is in the collection we can decide on the best outcome for the maps, for now we have stored them as per the advice of the people at Archival Survival.

We have met with ARTC twice regarding the new bridge at Wandong, we now have a plan of what the design will be and by the time this goes to print they will have conducted more community consultation.

There is an opportunity for a public artwork to be included in the redevelopment and we have given ARTC an idea of an artwork commemorating the journey of Hume and Hovell who as we know came through our town on their journey. We hope the community can get behind this project so this time we get an installation that we want not something that the shire chooses as the last disastrous so-called consultation process resulted in.

This project will mean a lot of disruption and inconvenience for everyone, and it will go on for some time, however ARTC have spent a considerable time in Wandong and will be here prior to work starting so the time for objections and being able to influence the project will soon be over.

The history group and Heritage Victoria will be watching with interest as any artefacts found during the works must be reported, work must stop until HV give permission for work to recommence. We know there are artefacts there having seen them for ourselves so it will be very surprising if nothing is found by the contractors.

#### Farm Security in the Spotlight

Farm security has recently come into the spotlight with an increase of stock and farm equipment theft.

Farm security can be harder to achieve with neighbours spaced further apart and the perimeter of your properties can be quite extensive. However, it is for this reason, and the recent increase in crimes related to farms, we have come up with a list of hints to keep you and your farm safer:

- Fences are physical barriers and they need to be maintained. We recommend fences and a solid gate, however, hedging or even old immovable farm equipement can be used as a barrier for unauthorised entry to your property.
- · Gates should be installed to all fence openings and can even be automated to operate remotely. This gives the farmer the ability to screen persons coming onto your property.
- · Security systems can be installed to monitor farm buildings and the perimter of your property. These can be solar powered and the signal sent back to your phones.
- Signs can deter criminals. At the very least they should state 'No Tresspassing' although ones that advertise your CCTV cameras are even better.
- · Lights keep your property, especially around entry points and farm buildings, well lit. Better still, make them motion detection lights. Criminals don't want to be seen and this is still one of the best deterrents.
- · Security tags your more expensive, vehicles or treasured pieces of farm equipment can be fitted with a concealed GPS tracking tag. This can help your items be found and returned to you.

- · Record of all of your farm assets this includes all machinery, vehicles, tools and stock. Records can be in the form of photographs or written records specifying the manufacturer, model type and any other distinguishing details; and
- · Mark your equipment, quad bikes and tools with an engraver in a discreet place using a 'V' + your licence number.

We have shown you some of the things you can do around your farm to make it safer, but the best forms of defence can be getting to know your neighbours, know their vehicles and know when there are criminals casing your farms. Farms can be isolated but keeping an eye on each others farm can be one of the best ways for everyone to stay safe.
