MITCHELL SHIRE - SWORN TO SECRECY - NO COMMUNITY CONSULTATION NOW IT'S JOHN HOLLAND CONSTRUCTIONS "WE WILL NOT BE CHANGING ANYTHING"

Following a meeting in February of members of the Wandong Heathcote Junction Community Group and the Wandong History Group with officers from Inland Rail., John Holand Constructions and the Mitchell Shire Council it was agreed that a John Holland engineer would be requested to attend a follow up meeting to explain the rationale regarding a footpath around the Rail Street roundabout rather than the logical path under the new bridge. The meeting was held on Wednesday 26th March and another disgraceful performance followed. This engineer opened with the "we will not be changing anything"

statement before providing a load of waffle endeavouring to justify its decision., which we might add was also promoted by Mitchell Shire officers in direct conflict with the community wishes.

It was pointed out that residents from the north of the bridge will walk up the Wandong Broadford Road, cross the bridge and join Pickett Walk rather than the John Holland / Mitchell Shire option of taking two pedestrian crossings and walk around the roundabout.

Common sense - forget it when you have officers making decisions such as this.

Norm Hulett is turning 100 on the 7th May this year.



After years of campaigning Mitchell Shire for the revamp of the Wandong bushfire park car park, two months ago we were advised that the plan will be produced within six weeks. Hopefully we will get a say in the design and it will be displayed to the community for comment. A discussion with a Mitchell Shire Officer some weeks ago presented some concerns when some important aspects of the plan seemed to be overlooked. We are still waiting on the plan.

The grate for the drain in Rail Street around the corner from Affleck Streeet remains a problem. It is regularly blocked with mud, leaves, etc causing water to cross Rail Street at road level. For the first time it appears Mitchell Shire has cleared the debris from the grate and removed the pile of accumulated debris. Hopefully it takes on this task more regularly releasing our members from the task.

We wrote to Mitchell Shire asking for the trees overhanging the mesh fence on Rail Street be cut before they fall on and further damage the fence and block traffic on Rail Street. The expected handball response from Mitchell Shire gave responsibility to VicTrack because the trees are on the Victrack side of the fence. However as the fence belongs to Mitchell Shire and the tree branches extend over the fence you would think Mitchell Shire would at least cut these branches to the fence line before they become a problem. Mitchell Shire has





removed a large gum tree in the parking area on Rail Street opposite Affleck Street but left the stump which poses a risk for drivers . We have asked Mitchell Shire to reduce this stump to ground level.

GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

This April is going to be a busy month with Anzac Day coming a few days after Easter Monday and it's a great time to be in the garden. Cooler weather, so good for pruning back plants that may have got away from us during Summer when it's too hot for us and for the plants as they can suffer from moisture loss when pruned in the hot weather. Water well and apply a Seasol solution before you start pruning and upon completion of pruning. Check if the plant you are wanting to prune has already flowered, the best time for pruning, such as Autumn/Winter flowering Camellias. It doesn't take long for weeds to grow in our garden beds and of course, anywhere we don't want them. Get them out before they take a good strong hold because pulling them out later is harder and soil comes out with their roots. I know the Easter Bunny will be coming this month and let's hope that's the only bunny visiting our garden. If they are digging around the roots of your plants, scrape away mulch and lay chicken wire around the trunk of the plant, anchoring it down, then replace the mulch. The active bunnies do a lot of damage by digging, they expose roots allowing them to dry out, they break new fibrous roots that the plants feed on and when they eat the roots, oh, that's nasty. And what about our bulbs, they're not far away from making an appearance. If your soil has dried out now is a great time to treat it with Seasol water saving liquid (before the foliage emerges) and apply well-rotted cow manure. Crush it up in water as a liquid application so it absorbs into the soil better. If possible, fence off the bulb area so the bunnies don't eat the new foliage as it pushes its way through the soil. In fact, all soil can be treated in this way to ensure all moisture is absorbed and doesn't run off. After such a dry Summer, water is liquid gold, and we shouldn't waste a drop. A lot of deciduous plants dropped their leaves early before showing their lovely colours, it may be a good idea to keep an eye on them, as the weather gets cooler, and ensure they are watered if Autumn is dry, and a few applications of Seasol to assist their root system. Deciduous



plants can be tricky and if you are buying bare rooted roses, ornamental plants, grape vines, fruit trees etc, ensure you buy from a reputable seller. Quality nurseries will guide you through the planting process and they are available for after care of the plant. You may pay a little more however, come Spring leaves will appear. There are some stunning deciduous plants, Forest Pansy, Redbud, Cotinus, Maple varieties including Japanese Maples, Crepe Myrtles, ornamental Pistachio and heaps more. Don't forget annuals, they make a lovely display on dull days, along with bulbs there are Pansies, Viola, Alyssum, Snapdragons, Calendula and much more. This is a great month to plant up any potted plants that have outgrown their original pot. The weather is cooler, the root system will benefit from fresh potting mix and a bigger house or pop in the ground and let them spread their roots. Autumn is a fantastic time, getting out there and really enjoying it.

In Home Fire Safety

Fires within the home can be devastating and sometimes fatal. If a fire were to start in your home while you were sleeping, you would not smell the smoke. The best chance of survival is having working smoke alarms in all sleeping areas. Smoke alarms should be.

- Tested monthly
- Dusted around the outside cover at least once a year
- If your alarm uses 9-volt battery it should also be replaced every year

To test your alarm, press the test button on the smoke alarm and wait for the 'beep, beep' If it does beep this means your alarm is working.

Remember, only working smoke alarms save lives.

If a fire were to start within your home, you need to have an escape plan. Things you will need to consider when creating your plan.

- Keeping your exits clear
- Leaving keys in locked doors and security doors when you are inside so you can escape if a fire occurs
- Knowing how to get out of your room if a fire was outside the door
- Get out and stay out
- Having a safe meeting place outside of the home eg letterbox, footpath
- Call Triple Zero (000) and ask for FIRE



WANDONG FIRE BRIGADE

It has been a busy start of the year for the brigade with new firefighters, training courses, several high-resource incidents, and the juniors starting back. We have four new firefighters who completed their general firefighting training and have joined us on the truck! Other firefighters have completed competencies in advanced 4-wheel

driving, and other training including visits to the Pretty Sally Fire Tower, and training with Wallan Fire Brigade and the SES.

Wandong Fire Brigade has attended several large fires including those at Beveridge, Willowmavin, Donnybrook and Heathcote Junction, and the Broadford Paper Mill. We have been called to a number of motor vehicle accidents and rescues on the Hume Freeway and up Mt Dissa, in addition to washaways and diesel spills on the Hume Freeway.

If you have a 9-volt smoke alarm, this is the time to replace the battery. After 10 years every smoke alarm should be replaced, regardless of the type. Remember, Only Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives.

Dogs to Drones

When Captain Scott died in 1912 on his way back from the South Pole, his story became a myth embedded in the national imagination.

Scott's team suffered inadequate food supplies, severe weather conditions and failing health so Captain Oates sacrificed his life in the hope of saving his comrades, leaving the tent in a terrible blizzard with the famous last words "I am just going outside and may be some time." His body has never been found. A more recent connection to the South Pole and Antarctic exploration was delivered to members of the Combined

Probus Club of Whittlesea when Captain Jorgen Berg was the guest presenter for their April meeting.

Originally from Denmark, he undertook his first voyage as a deck apprentice for 10 months on board the *Kista Dan* in 1962/63. He later saw active service in the Royal Danish Navy, serving in mini-corvettes from 1967-69.

Then with his appetite for the South Atlantic and Antarctic whetted, he undertook three separate full seasons from 1971 ending in 1977 in the Antarctic consisting of at least six separate voyages. He spent a total of 500 days on board undertaking various re-supply tasks in different locations. He rose from officer/mate to Chief Officer!

The Lauritzen Ships, *Thala Dan, Kista Dan, Magga Dan* and the last and probably most well-known, *Nella Dan* (1962 -1987), were almost synonymous with shipping in the early years of Australia's Antarctic program. They sailed regularly from ports of Port Melbourne and Hobart. Their vivid red paint made them quite conspicuous.

Captain Jorgen now lives in Australia, after many years of seagoing experience and senior port management roles in the US, Dominican Republic, France, Denmark and here in Australia. His presentation was a slideshow interspersed with commentary; he said he had enough slides for one every 25 seconds in the time allowed but we had an edited version.

We learned that 43% of Antarctica is Australia's claim and that there is no ownership or right to deny. Countries have bases strategic to their needs, and some are certainly for self-interest. France has claimed part of Australia's original allocation as it is logistically advantageous.

After WW2, Dr Phillip Law was instructed by the Menzies Government to set up a base. The establishment of the first station on Antarctica was in 1953, and is Mawson Station. Like many early explorers lots of difficulties ensued when the first two ships were unable to break through the ice.

Fortuitously the expedition was during the northern summer and ice breaker ships at the top of the world were laid up. Arrangements were made for the Kista Dan to come south and force herself through the pack ice into required stations in the Antarctic mainland.

Jorgen told of being stranded for 31 days until the ice could be broken. His slides showed ships iced up and the crew having to dig the ice away. One slide showing the ship in heavy seas had the effect of an audience member feeling seasick. Not to mention the hidden crevices! Jorgen advised that the gale force winds lasted six full days.

Schedules to Antarctica commenced in the month of December. Ships had to leave Antarctica no later than beginning of March. After the beginning of March, there is a high risk of being frozen in by the increasing amount of pack ice with winter coming.

The method of release is to thrust forward and then reverse until enough clear water allows the front of the ship to mount the ice. The weight of the ship then breaks the ice and it stabilises for further repeats. We learned how the crew is instructed to carefully manage the rudder and how the eggshell shape of the hull allows the ship to be completely out of the water. Clear water lasts only a few minutes as the pack-ice "returns home".

All equipment is shipped in except these days fresh food that is air freighted to give the staff basic creature comforts. Antarctica is an island like any other and as you move away from the coast the frozen land is solid and planes of all sorts can land and take-off. In the time when Jorgen was there they transported everything by ship from Hobart.

When the bases were being established dog sleds were the method of transport, but today the most updated equipment including drones are used for all manner of distribution.

Captain Berg could have emulated Captain Oates and "be some time" but he got finished with 27 seconds to spare. The audience applause was significant whilst Michael Halley thanked him and gave a small token of appreciation. The Club welcomes visitors and membership inquires. WHAT TRAINING METHOD IS BEST ?


Are you having trouble with your dog?

From my experience the same principle applies when it comes to teaching dogs. If you lock yourself in to using any specific "training method" it will suit some of our dogs, but NOT others ... instead we need to be open and think about how our dog learns AND it is important to also remember the handler who is on the other end of the leash... as both dog and handler learn best in their own way.

Formal studies are now starting to delve into how dogs learn but for the the most part the science is just playing catch up with what many dog people already know.

Consider how the traditional 'Obedience' style of training is more about SIT, DROP, HEEL, but this doesn't work to solve your lifestyle problem and it is difficult for both the human and the dog to relate this into your everyday life.


This explains why there are often dogs who might do great when they are practicing their training at home but then

become excited during group classes. Food training or clicker training is terrific when the dog is food motivated but when your dog is highly distracted say walking in the street and spies a new dog - then he doesn't have any interest in the food you are offering.

It is important to understand both the dog and the human are individuals so the object is to find what style works for both. So don't give up, you might need to seek help from different clubs or trainers before you find the one that works for you and your dog.

Remember with any training, we are NOT trying to change the individuals personality ... we can only change behaviour.....

- Schedule & Sign Plan deliveries for times when you or a trusted individual will be at home and can sign for your parcel. Many delivery services offer flexible scheduling options, accommodating your availability and minimising the risk of theft.
- Parcel lockers Explore the option of a parcel locker. These secure lockers provide a designated and protected space for your deliveries, significantly reducing the risk of theft.
- Click & Collect Services like ParcelPoint offer convenient local delivery and pickup locations, making it easy to manage your parcels on your schedule. Merrifield and Kilmore News & Lotto Stores have ParcelPoints. Many retailers also provide Click & Collect services for online purchases.
- Method of Payment When engaging in online shopping, opt for a debit card with enough funds to cover the cost of the goods and a small buffer. Credit cards can offer extra protections against fraudulent charges,

ensuring a safer transaction, however they may risk unauthorised transactions.

- Doorbell cameras Enhance your security measures by investing in smart home devices, such as doorbell cameras or security cameras. These devices not only monitor your property but also serve as a deterrent to potential thieves, contributing to community safety.
- Insurance Parcel insurance can be taken out to cover the lost, damaged or stolen goods
- Report the crime We recommend all crime is reported to Victoria Police so that action can be taken against these crooks.



Carer Gateway - Counselling

The Carer Gateway Counselling Service is a free service for carers.

As a carer you often have a lot going on in your life. There are appointments to make and then remember, medications to be given, the physical strain of providing care and sometimes there can be a financial burden as well. All this with little time to rest and recharge your batteries.

Caring can be tiring, overwhelming, isolating & stressful and at some point you may need to ask for some help.

Counselling helps you to find ways to manage what seems challenging and helps to find ways to cope with stress.

So what is counselling?

Counselling allows carers to tell their story and voice their thoughts and feelings in a safe and supportive environment.

Counselling is a conversation between yourself and a trained counsellor to help you resolve specific problems. After a brief introduction and getting to know you period, you and your counsellor will discuss the issues you may need help with. Your counsellor will encourage you to set some goals and together you will work to find the best way forward.

Counselling aims to help you gain insight to your thought processes and behaviours and give you tools and resources to resolve problems on your own.

Everything you discuss is private and confidential. The only exception is if something threatens your wellbeing or the wellbeing of others. Your counsellor will discuss this duty of care with you at your first session.

The Carer Gateway can provide up to six counselling sessions to carers and can be accessed either in-person or via phone.
