C'mon 'fess up!

It's confession time! Over the past few issues, I have been thoughtless and ignorant quoting Bible references to emphasize various points in my discussions. I assumed that Bibles would be front and centre of every bookshelf and library.

To rectify what may be a problem I have decided to offer free Bibles to any who wants to read up on passages of interest.

All you need to do to get a Bible delivered (no steak knives) just write to Box 379 Wallan 3756 and I will post out or deliver a Bible to your address. There will be no more correspondence with you unless requested.

While we are on the subject of confession let's have a look at what the Bible has to say about the subject. Somewhere the Bible says if we confess our wrongdoings, either it be in our thoughts, actions, plans, or designs, God will forgive our sins and separate them as far as the east is from the west (you can't ask for anything better than that.) Actually, the reference is found in Psalm chapter 103 verse 12. However, try to make time to read the whole chapter it's got some ripper insights, directions and word pictures of our loving, caring and forgiving God.

Furthermore, in Romans in the New Testament, we read that If God is for us who then can be against us, and it goes on to list an assortment of situations that cover most eventualities. This may not be directly connected with confession but is very helpful, powerful and strengthening in all our endeavors. I just came across the verse in Romans; it's chapter 8 verse 31.

Actually, if you look up Romans in the later part of the Bible, give yourself plenty of time because it is captivating to read what Paul is saying to the Roman church. Keep in mind that the Gospels and a majority of the New Testament was written by people who knew Jesus or in some cases were close mates and took notes of what they saw personally. (Could have followed the same footy team as Jesus)

There's a saying that confession is good for the soul, there is probably more to this than we mean when we flippantly use this expression, in the Bible there is a powerful verse that states in no uncertain terms that if we confess (there's that word again) our failings, our thoughtlessness and our rejection of His commandments He is faithful and can be trusted to forgive us our sins and to purify us, and to follow another well-known Bible passage in John 3.16. God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that those who believe in Him will not perish but have everlasting life. WOW!

The Bible may appear at first sight to be not very inspiring in the opening chapters. (Keep in mind that this would be the Bible that Jesus used and quoted from.) Contained in the Old Testament are prophecies that have astounded, mystified and confounded many academics over the years. Foretelling, sometimes in minute detail, events that eventually took place to the surprise of the people of the time.

The New Testament is more the fulfilment of many of these early writings and the firsthand accounts of the events of the day. To search through the Bible first up, the New Testament may appear to be easier to follow, and maybe later, refer back to the older books for guidance, amazing prophesy, reference and earlier history.

GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

September, our first month of Spring and if the weather forecast is correct, we're due for a wet one. So, let's make the most of the moist conditions. If you haven't prepared the area around your plants to hold moisture, try to get it done now. Apply a wetting agent, lightly work in wellrotted cow manure and follow up with mulch. If the plants are on an incline you may need to build a 'dam' wall on the lower side acting as a catchment to hold any moisture giving it a chance to soak in before it runs off. Start fertilising your garden now if you haven't done so already, a pelletised type is good and can be applied every two months, it may take a couple of weeks to become active in the soil. If you are fertilising plants currently in flower, use a liquid fertiliser to get working straight away. Remember the bulbs, using a liquid fertiliser so they can readily take it into the bulb itself ready for next year's flowers. As Daphnes finish flowering you can take cuttings from them or peg layer to eventually grow a new plant that can be cut off from the main plant after a few months, once it shows new shoots. September is a lovely month as blossom appears on many plants, fruit trees will start to blossom in preparation for their work to produce a variety of fruit for us to enjoy. Ensure they are kept well-watered and fertilised to help them along and don't forget roses, they work hard as well producing many blooms from Spring right through to Autumn and if you prefer you can use a fertiliser specifically for roses. As you can for Citrus, Camilleas, natives, veggies and various other plants. If you having been thinking of adding a plant to your garden that is famous for its blossom, and now is the time to search for your favoured plant, consider Red Bud, various types will reward you with beautiful displays. Check out the Ornamental Pears as well, you can get them in a spreading form, all the way to a narrow grower that is used considerably in small spaces. Any plants that may have finished flowering can be pruned back and indeed prune hedges, topiary, etc before the heat of Summer kicks in. Try to maintain moisture levels in your soil at this time of the year with deep waterings if you need it, because if we have a dry Spring and soil becomes hydro-phobic it's an uphill battle to get it back to being super absorbent. Dry soil can resist moisture and allows it to flow away from the root system instead of soaking in around the plant and some plants, especially natives will not cope with extreme soil conditions. Keep in mind plants such as Kangaroo Paw, Agonis, some Grevilleas and various other natives, come from Western Australia where the soil is sand based, free flowing and they can be unfamiliar with



extreme changes in soil, temperate and rainfall. This is also a good time of the year to check out your hanging baskets and potted plants, top dress / replant any that are looking tired because good quality fresh potting mix will give them a new lease of life ready for Summer and they will have the ability to withstand varying temperatures a bit easier. Remember to line the inside of Terracotta pots with newspaper or cardboard before filling with potting mix to slow moisture lose through the pot. September is a great month to get heavy work done in the garden before the days heat up, such as paving and pathways and don't forget irrigation installation, fantastic for saving time.


We have also had a donation of a milk bottle from Number 2 Camp at MT Disappointment and thank Trevor Vienet for facilitating that donation.

Traffic changes and utility works Wandong 1 to 30 September 2025



John Holland will undertake road realignment and utility relocation works in Wandong in preparation for the construction of the new bridge. These works require temporary long-term traffic management.

Work being done

- Installation of concrete barriers along Broadford-Wandong Road
- Construction of temporary access road parallel to Broadford-Wandong Road
- Construction of piling pads, and drainage works
- Roadworks to raise Epping-Kilmore Road
- Removal of redundant aerial cables and poles
- Service investigations, surveys and utility relocation
- · Approved vegetation removal.

What can I expect?

- Works 7am-6pm Monday to Friday and 7am-1pm Saturdays
- Works 7am-6pm on Saturday 13 and Sunday 14 September during 60-hour rail possession
- Temporary long-term shuttle flow and traffic management on Epping-Kilmore Road and Broadford-Wandong Road
- · Traffic management and reduced road speeds
- Nearby residents may experience some noise and vibration.

Machinery used

Non-destructive digging truck, small truck mounted drill rigs, excavators, asphalt paver, tree grinder, mobile crane, grader, workers using hand tools, survey equipment and traffic management equipment.

How we're managing impacts

- · Traffic management and reduced road speeds
- · Access will be maintained to all properties

- · Environmental controls will be in place
- An arborist and qualified wildlife handler will assess all trees before removal.

On a wing and a prayer

The Melbourne Pigeon Society Inc. (MPS) is one of the oldest pigeon clubs in Australia [established in Victoria in 1913]. It was founded to encourage the breeding and exhibiting of all varieties of pigeons and to foster friendliness and good fellowship between fellow members and other breeders.

Mark Tung the current President of MPS gave of his time to visit the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea Inc. and give members a comprehensive overview of pigeons (Racing & Fancy) and the various activities of owners and club members. Mark is dedicated to the objectives of the Club and is renowned judge at the five annual shows. The most recent was the 37th Australian National Pigeon Society [ANPA] National Show, held at the new showgrounds in Ballarat from July 18 to July 20, 2025

He took up the pigeon hobby at 12 years old in the footsteps of his Grandfather and four years later became an individual racer at the age of 16. He has been involved with racing pigeons ever since, which started with the Western Pigeon Federation [WPF], which Mark is a Life Member and now for the last 15 years has been competing in the Victorian Homing Association [VHA] Established 1900 and is currently serving the position of Vice President, in its pinnacle the VHA had a membership of 600 members. The membership has now evolved into four separate organisations and the total membership has lessened, but is still vibrant.

Pigeons are born with an instinct to return to their home loft, but scientists believe it's more than just instinct. They seem to have a natural toolkit for finding their way. One major theory is that they can sense the Earth's magnetic field. It's thought that pigeons have tiny magnetic sensors in their beaks or brains that help them detect direction, almost like they have a compass built into their bodies.

To be a pigeon owner needs much dedication and self-discipline. Mark had been on his feet since before daylight, not only looking after his pigeons but also another passion of Greyhound racing. Pigeon lofts need to be cleaned twice a day and each day their diet varies. The training is a long-term commitment commencing with short "return home" practices which are extended until a competitive long distance is attempted.

Even with all these natural abilities, racing pigeons don't just wake up one day ready to fly hundreds of miles. They need practice. Owners usually start by letting them fly short distances, gradually building up to longer flights. This training helps the birds become familiar with different routes and conditions. The connection to their loft also plays a huge part. It's not just where they sleep – it's where they feel safe. The bond they form with their home gives them a strong reason to return.

The racing pigeon originated in Belgium and spread through England and Europe and then to the new world. But in recent times the westernised China has more of less taken control of premium breeding stock and prices as high as 1.8 million Euro[AUD \$3,218,580.00] attained for a female bird. Aggravating the situation is quarantine regulations. Up until three years ago Australian breeders were major importers of desired blood lines, but the avian flu outbreak meant a cessation and continuing constraints.

We learnt about the manner in which competitions are conducted and the distances that some routes cover. The VHA start races as far away as Berri in South Australia [530km], and Tasmania [640 km]. There is an Alice Springs to Adelaide event organised in South Australia.

Many slides showing the multitude of Pigeons that exist were shown. Including two Australian breeds the Australian Saddleback Tremblers and the Australian Performing Tumblers originating in 1860 but not recognised as a breed until the early $20^{\rm th}$ century.

Speciality follows exotic breeding and this is true with pigeons. Two Australian Veterinarians are world renowned. One mentioned was Dr Colin Walker OAM. Dr Walker has raced pigeons since 1969 and has won numerous racing events, He also breeds and shows exhibition pigeons and has had numerous national champions.

In 2000, he was inducted into the Victorian Homing Association (VHA) Hall of Fame for "For his contribution to the Association over a long period of time as Honorary Veterinarian. Further his contribution to the sport in general by removing myth and replacing it with proper health procedures and practices."

Time was on the wing [pun intended] and Mark was only able to gloss over the involvement of pigeons in World

Wars. The Australian War Memorial Pigeons in War Australian War Memorial has magnificent detail of pigeons in wartime. Pigeons have also been awarded Dickin Medals the animal equiveant of the Victoria Cross.

Mr Tung was presented with a small token of appreciation and resounding applause from the attentive audience.

Electric Powered Bikes

E-bikes have become a popular mode of transport, but what are the regulations, safety measures and penalties if you breach the rules.

Electric bikes (e-bikes) have become a popular mode of transport in Victoria, offering a convenient, eco-friendly way to travel around our shire. However, to ensure safety of riders and others on the road, it's important to understand the legal requirements and best practices associated with riding e-bike use in Victoria.

Legal Use of E-Bikes in Victoria

In Victoria, e-bikes are classified as bicycles with an electric motor that assist pedaling. The laws distinguish between different types of e-bikes based on their motor power and speed capabilities:

- Pedelecs (pedal assist e-bikes) are the most common type, where the motor activities only when you pedal, and assistance cuts out at 25 km/h.
- Throttle e-bikes are bikes which can be powered solely by a throttle without pedaling, but in Victoria, their use is more restricted and often classified separately.

Legal Requirements for E-Bikes In Victoria

Victoria has the following legal requirements:

- Motor power & speed limits: the e-bike must have a maximum motor power of 250 watts. The motor assistance must cut out when the bike reaches 25km/h.
- Registration & licensing: e-bikes that meet the above criteria are classified as bicycles and do not require registration, or licensing. Throttle e-bikes require registration, a license and must follow road rules.

- · Helmet laws: helmets are mandatory for all e-bike riders
- Age restrictions: riders must be at least 12 years old to operate a pedelec e-bike, throttle e-bike riders need to be at least 18 years old to be licensed.
- Paths and road use: pedelec e-bikes can be ridden on shared paths, bike lanes and roads designated for bicycles.

Safety Advice for E-Bike Riders

Riders can significantly reduce the risk of injury by following these safety tips:

- · Wear a Helmet: Helmets are mandatory
- Be Aware of Surroundings: Watch out for pedestrians, vehicles, cyclists, and road hazards.
- Observe Traffic Rules: Obey road signs, signals, and lane markings.
- Keep Speed in Check: avoid riding at speeds that increase risk, particularly in crowded environments.
- · Be visible: wear bright clothing.
- Use Lights: At night or in low visibility conditions, ensure your e-bike has functioning front and rear lights.
- Avoid Distractions: Do not use mobile phones or headphones while riding.
- Maintain Your E-Bike: Regularly check brakes, tyres, lights and battery health to ensure it's in good working condition.

Penalties for Breaching E-Bike Rules

Victoria Police enforce these regulations strictly. Penalties for violating e-bike laws can include fines for riding an unregistered e-bike, demerit points or criminal charges such as reckless riding. For more information, refer to police.vic.gov.au.





Welcome to our August 2025 update, where we share details of our recent exploration and community engagement activities. We welcome hearing from you at any time with questions or feedback, or if you would like clarification around any aspect of our operations. Please reach out to us on the details on the next page.

Exploration update

Southern Cross Gold Consolidated (SXGC) has continued its exploration efforts with activities aimed at better understanding the local geology.

A key part of this work is our diamond drilling program, which is currently operating nine drill rigs on site.

These rigs collect core samples from deep underground, providing important insights into the mineral potential of the area.

SXGC has invested in additional noise suppression measures including locally engineered acoustic panels. These panels will be installed around drill sites closest to residences to create a consistent sound buffer and reduce any impact from drilling operations.

In addition to drilling, the team will be collecting soil samples in spring to analyse surface materials.

Retention Licence RL006040, which expired in July, has been successfully renewed. SXGC submitted the renewal application to Resources Victoria before the expiry date, and it was approved in August for a further four years. Under the Mineral Resources Development Act, the licence continues while a renewal application is being assessed until a decision is made.

Exploration tunnel update

SXGC has formally submitted its application to the resources regulator to construct an exploration tunnel. The submission includes the relocation of the basement rock stockpile to avoid a recently identified cultural heritage zone. This adjustment moves the stockpile to the south, further reducing the potential for impact on nearby residents.

The application will be assessed by Resources Victoria, part of the Department of Environment, Energy and Climate Action (DEECA). It will also be assessed by other government agencies including the EPA, Goulburn Murray Water and other environmental departments within DEECA.

Building Homes for Wildlife: Landcare Workshop Constructs Nest Boxes

Members of the Upper Plenty Merri Catchments Landcare Group (UPMCLG), together with local residents and conservation enthusiasts, came together at local property Walwa Park for a hands on workshop to build nest boxes for native wildlife.

Led by the local Landcare Coordinator Chris Cobern, participants learnt practical skills in constructing sturdy, safe boxes designed to provide much needed shelter for ringtail possums, Brush tailed Phascogales Krefts (sugar) gliders and a range of bird species. These small, tree dwelling mammals and birds play an important role in local ecosystems and are important contributors to healthy bushland. Ringtail possums, primarily herbivores, consume fruits and seeds, aiding in plant regeneration. Krefts gliders and Phascogales, on the other hand, help control insect populations as their contribution to forest health. Both species also play a role in pollination as they move through their environment and are part of the predator to prey dynamics within these settings.

The specially designed nest boxes mimic the natural hollows found mainly in mature eucalypt trees, which can take more than a century to form. The loss of old hollow-bearing trees through land clearing, fire, and storm damage has left many populations vulnerable and today they often struggle to find natural nesting hollows due to habitat loss. By using natural timber and wildlife friendly construction methods, the boxes offer a long lasting, secure alternative shelter for the possums and gliders.

"The workshop was a fantastic way to combine conservation action with community spirit," said Chris Cobern, Landcare Coordinator. "By building these nest boxes, we're giving our wildlife a helping hand while also empowering people with the skills they need to take conservation into their own backyards." "We'd also like to recognise Bunnings Craigieburn for their donation of the timber and hardware used to make the boxes."

Following the morning's activities, participants enjoyed a shared lunch, providing time to connect, share stories, and discuss future conservation opportunities.

As part of the workshop, participants were able to take one next box each home that they constructed to install them in suitable landscapes and private gardens. Additional nest boxes built during the workshop will be installed by the UPMCLG at their Dry Creek Restoration Project, and at other suitable bushland and private properties across the district. UPMCLG President David Markham said he would like to thank all the Landcare volunteers and participants for their enthusiasm and commitment to protecting our native species. "These workshops create safe havens for wildlife while fostering stronger community engagement in our local conservation efforts" he said.




Awards Night

Spring has finally arrived which means the fire season is not too far away.

According to the Australian Seasonal Bushfire Outlook we are likely to experience an early start to the fire season, with drought affected areas facing an increased risk.

Now is the time to.

- Cut back over hanging branches (no branches within 10m of buildings)
- Remove shrubs, plants and other flammable materials from the bottom of your trees
- · Look for bark and dead branches hanging off your trees
- Keep shrubs and other plants pruned and away from your house
- Don't leave piles of green waste near your home (take it to the tip or, if you can burn off before restrictions come into force)




When preparing for summer you also need to consider whether a fire truck will have clear access to your property.

Did you know we need 3.5 metres for the width for our trucks? With an additional 0.5 metres clearance to pass through gates or to move past structures.

We also need 4 metres above to be clear of obstructions to avoid damage to our equipment and crews. How long is your driveway? Is there somewhere safe for us to turn around?

Completed in late 2024, the \$800,000 project has delivered a range of improvements that have transformed the centre into a modern, functional and welcoming community hub.

The works included the installation of new male, female and accessible toilet facilities, a fully updated kitchen, and an expanded meeting room with additional storage space to better cater for the needs of local user groups.

The main hall now features acoustic treatments that make it more comfortable for meetings, performances and social gatherings, while upgraded heating and cooling ensure the centre can be used comfortably year-round. Accessibility and safety upgrades to parking, fencing, gates and surfaces have also made it easier for people of all ages and abilities to enjoy the space.

The project was made possible thanks to \$720,000 from the Victorian Government, \$20,000 from the Wandong and Heathcote Junction Sports and Community Centre Committee of Management and \$60,000 from Mitchell Shire Council.

The project, which was completed in late 2024, included:

- new male, female and accessible toilets
- fully updated kitchen
- expanded meeting room with extra storage
- acoustic treatments in the main hall
- upgraded heating and cooling for year-round comfort
- improved accessibility and safety for parking, fencing, gates and surfaces.

Local groups are making the most of the modern, functional and welcoming space, with the upgrades creating more opportunities for events, activities and social connections.

Our representations to VicRoads regarding the lowering of the speed limit on the Epping Kilmore Road through Heathcote Junction has apparently been received favourably. We wait with anticipation.

Pickett Walk was affected by Inland Rail work to install a pipe from Rail Street to the Epping Kilmore Road. Most of the walk was closed for the work but much of it has reopened since. However the walk cannot be fully opened and regretfully will probably be closed for the duration of the project due to the unusable work area on Rail Street.

At very large expense to the WHJCG, and at the suggestion of Mr Vivian Kenney, we have installed a rose arbour at the entrance to the Wandong Bushfire / War Memorial Park and Wandong Rose Garden. To finish the project, we planted an additional fifty roses, all generously donated by Diana and Graham Sargent of Silkies Rose Farm.

We continue to clear rubbish from our town - it is a pity that we have to keep doing this with little help from the community. If only we had other residents with the same commitment to keep our town beautiful. Even collecting any rubbish around the street in front of your property would help - particularly on busy streets like Rail Street and North Mountain Road.

The Wandong Heathcote Junction Community Group will not be holding the Wandong Christmas Carols this year and will review the event for 2026 and beyond. Reasons for the decision are declining attendance each year - last year we even introduced a robovac door prize drawn at the conclusion of the carols so the audience stayed to the end, the probable requirement to secure a Council permit unless we do not hold any outdoor activities such as the BBQ, the aging and unwell organisers - Vivian and Jeanette included are not able perform, the cost of the event including food, magic show, etc.

We are sorry to call a halt to this event after 15 years and hope that new blood will come forward in the future to resurrect the Wandong carols in 2026.

At a recent meeting with Mittchell Shire officers the following issues are some of those raised: Bushfire Memorial Park Car Park (Bitumen, Bollards, Drain) Plans

RESPONSE: This is currently going through DTP approvals. These can take some time and DTP have recently requested further information to consider this.

Footpath maintenance

Concerns were raised about cracked concrete pavement (35 sections) on Rail Street and deteriorating bitumen on North Mountain Road.

RESPONSE: These works would require a significant investment and would need to be considered as part of Council's Annual Capital Works Program. The WHJCG is encouraged to submit a formal request

One Trick to Training is Training Tricks ..

The big reason to train your dog is to build engagement between members in your family pack. Success is generally better using a less 'formal' method instead of just trying to increase 'obedience'. After all, obedience is more about owners wanting dogs who will do as they are **ordered** but often this has little (effect when a dog is under distractions. Another issue is that dogs and humans often become bored with a regimented style of training and then tend to give up.



Using some alternative training methods such as agility, scent work and herding will often have a dog far more engaged with their humans. But perhaps the most successful and definately one of my favourite methods is with Trick Training. The reason for this:

Learning Is best when the animal AND the human is having fun.

There are many skills that are developed when using tricks as a teaching process and this can be broken down to what the Handler learns and how the Dog can benefit.

Handler Skills: The main problem with most Humans is they have a tendency to talk too much. So as the humans tend to ramble on and on this generally makes it difficult for the dog to understand what is actually required. Often the rushing is because the human doesn't really have a plan for what they want to achieve so have a tendency to hurry thru any tasks and the dog loses interest. Instead:

- 1. SLOW THE PACE Teaching tricks is actually a way for the Handler to slow down the pace and then allow time for the dog to respond.
- CREATE THE STEPS Handler must break down the task into easy steps. This becomes easier for the dog to see what the human is asking. Then rewarding the dog for each of the step.
- TIMING Once the Handler learns to close their mouth and watch their dog, they can assess the
 dogs response and improve TIMING. They can reward each step and keep the dog keen to try
 more. Humans can then also see if the dog is getting confused so stop and give dog some time.

From the Dog's Point of View:

We must understand that a dog's brain does not process information in the same fashion as the human brain. A further complication is that different breeds of dogs work at different speeds.

e.g. The kelpie brain flicks from one thought to another at lightening speed, they see quick snapshots of a situation and move on to the next snapshot.... Kinda like having ADHD.... This can be very different to a Golden Retriever who is often slow to co-ordinate their actions together...

The human must be responsible to see the how their own dog processes information.

When teaching dogs we must introduce them to each new trick as a 'Concept' ... Remember a concept is something new that your dog might not have experience with. Here are two examples...

1. BACK UP - Dogs are four legged and generally used to just moving forward... their back legs follow their front legs so they don't really have to think about what their back end is doing.

e.g. When you watch a dog running it is common to see the dog turn sharply and their back legs can just slip out from under them. Also watch many dogs when they come to steps, they might seem



comfortable to travel UP but have more trouble with going DOWN. That is because going down steps requires the dog to have more co-ordination.

2. SPIN - Just like with humans, Dogs can be Left or Right 'handed' so they get comfortable with doing something one way but have trouble working the other. Teaching a dog to spin in both directions, helps to build both the dog and human's flexibility, physically and mentally.





Weather Report Heathcote Junction/Wandong AUGUST 2025

In the overall picture of august, the last month of winter, the weather showed it's wintery variations. Some days warmer and pleasant, others quite cold in the diurnal period. On two occasions we had severe cold blasts with damaging winds to finish the winter season.

Rainfall was light with a total of 66 mls of which 20.5 mls was recorded in the first half of the month and 45.5 mls in the second half with the majority in the last seven days of the month. We are still below the August ten year average for this area.
