GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

Hello to October, believe it or not, there's only just over two months before Santa comes to visit and let's hope he brings some rain with him. It's been quite dry, and this brings it home how important it is to be really diligent with preparation in ensuring any watering we do is not going to be wasted. If water is running away from your plants and/or not soaking into your lawn take action now to reduce stress on yourself and your garden. Treat the soil with a wetting agent, add organic matter and some fine white sand, water in well and add Gypsum, water in well again. If you can get well-rotted cow manure that's crumbly and in relatively small clumps, it would be ideal to spread it over your garden and lawn, water in well. Organic matter such as cow manure enhances the soil. If it's a sandy soil, it assists in holding moisture, if it's a clay soil (which holds lots of organic matter), it changes the structure of the soil so as to release the organic matter from the clay. Clay is amazing but unless you can get it to work for you it can be your worst enemy, cracking in Summer, muddy and badly drained in Winter. Like everything in life, if the foundations aren't good, it's hard to build on. Your plants require a good soil structure to get them started and they also need / thrive the very best if good soil structure can be maintained. Unhealthy soil can be the cause of unhealthy plants that dry out and wilt, unable to absorb any moisture, resulting in a collapsed root system. Every time a root system collapses both the plant and root system gets weaker creating a plant that may never do very well. If possible, take the plant out of the ground / pot, take off the excess soil and ensure all the roots are submerged in a solution of Seasol within about 60 seconds of disturbing the plant, grab the secateurs and prune the roots back by about 1/3 and pop back into the Seasol solution. By pruning, you open the root system up, it's a fresh wound that can absorb moisture and nutrients and hopefully give the plant a great chance to regenerate. Prepare the pot with fresh potting mix or incorporate organic matter into the soil ready for replanting, water in well and follow up with the Seasol solution. As our seasons change, they sometimes catch us off guard. As Winter leads into Spring we can forget that some Spring days can be quite warm and even warm and windy and quickly the soil may become dry, especially if the soil is exposed, poor

quality and with no mulch, protecting the ground, it's a little like us going out into the sun with no sunscreen and no drink of water, our skin dries out and we can dehydrate quickly. If we don't act promptly to ensure the soil is kept hydrated it can easily become hydrophobic and it takes a lot of time and energy to make it absorbent again and as the weather warms, we seem to be fighting against it. Pay particular attention to fruiting trees, new plantings, annuals, veggie gardens, potted plants, hanging baskets and weak plants. These will require quite a bit of TLC, they will be working hard and don't forget lawns, especially with high traffic areas, work you put in now will pay you back immensely.

Traffic changes, bridge prep works Wandong 1 to 31 October 2025



John Holland will continue works to prepare for construction of a new bridge in Wandong during October. There will be long-term temporary traffic changes in place during this time.

Work being done

- · Construction of temporary access road parallel to Broadford-Wandong Road
- · Bridge abutment, piling and retaining wall works
- · Construction of piling pads and drainage works
- Roadworks alongside Epping-Kilmore Road
- · Reinforced soil retaining wall construction along Rail Street
- Service investigations, surveys and utility relocation
- Approved vegetation removal.

What can I expect?

- · Works 7am-6pm Monday to Friday and 7am-1pm Saturdays
- Extended works 4.30am-7.30pm Monday 27 October
- · Long-term temporary shuttle flow and traffic management on Epping-Kilmore Road and Broadford-Wandong Road
- · Nearby residents may experience some noise and vibration.

Machinery used

Non-destructive digging truck, small truck-mounted piling rigs, concrete trucks, concrete pumps, excavators, asphalt paver, tree grinder, mobile crane, grader, workers using hand tools, survey equipment and traffic management equipment.

How we're managing impacts

- Traffic management and reduced road speeds

- Environmental controls will be in place
- · An arborist and qualified wildlife handler will assess all trees before removal.

With summer fast approaching now is the time to ensure you have a bushfire plan in place in case an emergency occurs. During emergencies not everyone is able to think clearly therefore it is best to take steps to get prepared before the fire season.

Things to consider when making a bushfire plan include;



Should I leave early?

Leaving early is the safest option to protect yourself and your family.

This means leaving the area before there are any signs of a fire – you may consider leaving on certain fire danger rating days. By leaving early you are avoiding panic, being trapped, making the wrong choices and risking serious injury or death

Defending Your Property

Planning to stay and defend is a big decision.

By staying and defending your property to are putting yourself and your family at serious risk of death or injury from uncontrollable fires on Extreme and Catastrophic fire danger days. Most homes in bushfire risk areas are not designed for Catastrophic conditions and we cannot guarantee that we will be able to get a fire truck to you. For more information about defending your property please visit the CFA website cfa.vic.gov.au – the information provided on this page can help you decide whether you are capable of defending your property or not, you can also find information about the risks and preparations involved to defend your property

How to plan

All family members should be involved in making your fire plan, as each member may have different needs that need to be considered.

Information and templates can be found at cfa.vic.gov.au in the Fire Ready Kit.

- 1. Which Fire Danger Rating is your trigger to leave?
- 2. Will you leave early that morning or the night before?
- 3. Where will you go?
- 4. What route will you take and what is your alternative in the event that a fire is already in the area?
- 5. What will you take with you?
- 6. What do you need to organise for your pets or livestock?
- 7. Who do you need to keep informed of your movements?
- 8. Is there anyone outside your household who you need to help or check up on?
- 9. How will you stay informed about warnings and updates?

What will you do if there is a fire in the area and you cannot leave?

Remember to decide who will do what as part of your plan.

Your destination and journey

Where will you go when you leave? It's up to you to decide on a suitable place to go when you leave early on a fire risk day. Things to consider include going to areas that are low risk such as, visiting a friend/family's house or community facilities such as libraries, shopping centres, swimming pools or cinemas. Communicate with your family and friends about how you'll know when to leave and where to go to stay safe. If you rely on others for care and support, your only safe option on serious fire risk days is to leave early – never wait to receive a warning.

Why write down your plan?

Writing down you plan and having it accessible to all family members is important as you may not be able to think clearly if you're surrounded by smoke, heat and flames.

If you do not already have a plan in place the CFA have a template that can be used <u>bushfire planning template – Leaving early</u> (PDF 2.6MB) – this can be found on the CFA website.

Share your bushfire plan

Bushfires can cause a lot of stress to neighbours and loved ones especially if they do not know where you are, or what your plans are in an emergency.

It is best to share your plan with family, friends and neighbours.

Remember, any bushfire plan – written or not – is better than no plan.

Foster Carers Sought

Knowing that many members of the Combined Probus of Whittlesea were dog friendly, the program co-ordinator reached out to the Australian Border Force (ABF) seeking a presentation about the Detector Dog Program (DDP).

It came to pass that several puppies with ambitions to become working detector dogs came along to the October meeting, and gave their human ABF colleagues the opportunity to tell the story.

Very few people would not have seen detector dogs in action either on the daily news or in specialised programs covering many of ABF activities.

The Australian Border Force (ABF) has announced it is expanding its Detector Dog Program (DDP) foster carer network to additional regional locations throughout Victoria.

Following the success of the program in Greater Melbourne and Geelong, eligibility will now be expanded to eligible households in Ballarat and Whittlesea.

ABF puppies, aged from nine weeks of age, are co-raised by foster carers who play a key role in their development by providing a safe and caring home, and providing exposure to a range of different environments, including shopping centres and community hubs.

Foster carer candidates looking to welcome a puppy into their households do not need to have previous experience looking after animals, and are able to access 24/7 support services.

The ABF covers dog food, equipment, veterinary expenses, and are able to look after puppies if foster carers need to head away from home or have holidays planned.

Foster carers are required to have a secure yard, be willing to socialise the puppy with people and animals, provide regular opportunities for exercise, and attend the DDP facility on three occasions throughout the year for training sessions.

The DDP features a specialised breeding, development, and training program, in order to raise young puppies to prepare them for a career as a working dog.

The ABF's breeding program began in Melbourne in 1993, and since then, has developed thousands of puppies to be trained as detector dogs that are also used by other government departments, agencies, and organisations.

ABF detector dogs are deployed across Australia to international airports, seaports, cargo depots, and mail centres. They are capable of screening large volumes of cargo, people, as well as narcotics, tobacco, firearms, explosives, and currency.

ABF Superintendent, Allister Keel, said that the expansion of the program is an exciting opportunity for animal lovers who can take pride in knowing they are playing a vital role in keeping the community safe.

"We're proud to offer a greater number of Victorians the opportunity to become involved in this highly rewarding program," Superintendent Keel said.

"Detector dog foster carers play a vital role in co-raising puppies who will one day work to protect our borders, and this expansion demonstrates our strong partnership with the community."

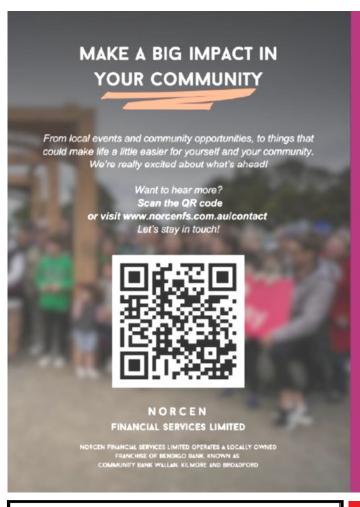

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Protecting your caravan

Whether you're on the road, at a campsite or in a holiday park, always keep your caravan doors and windows locked, valuables out of sight and secure your van with hitch locks and wheel clamps.

Caravans are a common sight on our roads, with around 1.5 million Australians taking off in their caravans, campers and motorhomes each year.

At the same time, caravan theft, and theft from caravan parks and campsites, is becoming more common. Around 500–600 caravans are stolen in Australia each year, while police report thieves are stealing unsecured items like fishing rods, eskies full of alcohol, shoes, bikes and even kayaks from caravan parks. Here are some simple steps you can take to avoid having your caravanning holiday ruined by thieves.

Parking your caravan

- Try to park your caravan where you key keep an eye on it, or put it in a busy location;
- If possible, don't reverse into your space. Instead put the hitch away from the normal access point; and
- If arriving at night, park your caravan in a well-lit and secure area if you can.

Securing your caravan

- Make it a habit that whenever you unhitch your caravan while travelling, put the hitch lock on straight away;
- Attach a wheel clamp to lock your caravan's wheels in place. Consider getting one that is made specifically for
- Invest in some good quality padlocks and put them on the arms of your awning and your stabiliser legs;
- If you have installed an alarm, activate it ever time you leave your caravan;

- · Go around and double check that all doors, windows and hatches inside your caravan are completely closed and locked every time you leave the van;
- Don't hide a spare set of car keys anywhere in or around your car, caravan or RV; and
- · Put a sensor light inside your van that turns on automatically when it gets dark, to help make it look like someone's inside, even when you're not there.

Protecting personal property

- Ensure items secured to the roof racks of your car or on your caravan are secured with locks. When you're at your destination, remove them from your vehicle and secure them inside your caravan;
- · Make sure bicycles are secured with a heavy-duty cable and padlock or, D-Lock to a fixed object.
- · Secure gas cylinders in your caravan's cylinder bins or on the "A frame" using a heavy-duty keyed padlock.
- If you do leave your vehicle for any reason, be sure to shut and latch all windows, lock all doors and close all curtains, so others can't see inside.
- If you're heading out for the day, or going to bed at night, make sure you store outdoor accessories safely away and locked the door.

Get to know your neighbours

- · When you are setting up at the caravan park or campsite, introduce yourself to your neighbours. If they know who owns the van, they'll be more likely to stop strangers from messing
- Talk to your caravanning neighbours and arrange to keep an eye on each other's vans. If you see something suspicious, ring the police on Triple Zero (000) immediately.

We look forward to the new season and having another successful year on and off the field.

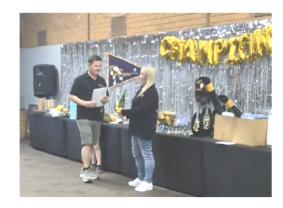

Remove flammable items from decks and verandas, mow grass close to the house to less than 10cm high. Do not have mulch within a 10-metre radius of the house. Evaluate Fire Truck Access to your property: Are your gates wide enough? Are there overhanging branches or objects that would prevent access? Are the water sources clearly marked? Dog Diets - Breaking Down Some Myths....!

There is often discussions about what is acceptable to feed dogs... friends say one thing, perhaps the vet another and don't get me started on TV/Internet advertising designed to convince us to part with our hard earned cash. We keep hearing statements such as "Dogs can't eat Human Food" ... "Dogs can't eat Garlic" ... "Commercial Food is Balanced"... "Raw Meat is Bad"... Often advice can be confusing, even contradictory. So for many it is easier to just give in and buy a bag of kibble with a picture of your dog breed... Perhaps I can offer another point of view to help you decide your best option.



First, Consider the Dog - Dogs have evolved over thousands of years to be 'Opportunistic Carnivores'

Meaning a dog primarily eats meat (a Carnivore) but will also consume other food sources when available. Thus they have a flexible diet which allows them to thrive in diverse environments and survive even if food is scarce. However some breeds (perhaps thru haphazard breeding or poor introduction to raw diet) can develop gut issues.

I look back to my youth of the 60's and 70's where dogs were fed predominately raw meat, bones and leftovers. Yet we didn't see or hear much in the way of allergies, cancers or dental problem. Also in this era many dogs were still healthy and active at 15 years of age and common to see dogs living till 18 years or so.

Commercial Pet Food appeared in the 80's and in the 90's the marketing of processed foods meant most were adding these foods to their weekly supermarket purchase. Hence a **multi-billion dollar** industry is was born... now they looking at ways to get YOU to put more of YOUR dollars into THEIR pockets.

It is understandable that Companies aim to make a profit.. So they can look to improve profit with ingredients in a cheaper format. Hence we now have a base for kibble called meat meal... This is basically a protein such as beef/chicken etc that is steamed and pulverised into a powdered form, however the majority of the nutrients can be lost in the cooking process, so they need to add the nutrients back in... perhaps using a synthetic premix powder.

Who should you listen to ...? Many Pet Professionals will recommend you feed an "all dry food diet" and they will state that dry kibble "has all the nutrients that your dog will ever need" - often added comments like - "provided you buy a good quality one", and they happen to have for sale on their shelves. Consider also most Vets are NOT pet Nutritionists (they are actually like a GP) yet seem happy to just regurgitate information provided by the commercial pet food companies. However these recommendations may often be based on research funded/ supplied by the pet food manufacturers!

It is also common for pet food Companies and even the vets tell you that the problem with a raw diet is that your dog can be exposed to bacteria that will make them sick - however if using standard procedures for your pet food as you would with human food.... i.e. refrigerate etc.... Then foods would be as safe as it is for us humans.

Who are the Specialists ...? The information out in the public can be confusing to the average dude. Social Media Groups provide lots of personal experiences and ideas, but you have to filter thru a great deal of dubious information and now also Al generated "facts" to find solid knowledge - and that is such a headache. Hence we took a different approach and decided to source the facts direct from Independent Research Professionals.

At a Conference in San Diego, I met **Wendy Volhard** who has researched dog diets for the last 30+ years and was a wealth of knowledge. Back in Australia a vet, **Dr. Bruce Syme**, had been developing his own feed program... It would seem that both of these Specialist Dietary Professionals have independently found the same health issues with the commercial foods and hence developed very similar programs. Some concerns noted.

- Most research has been conducted by feed manufacturers.
 Hence they own the studies and can pick and choose what information they wish to share.
- Consider also Manufacturers value profits this can become a higher priority than any concerns for the health of dogs.
- Nutrient values published on the pack are prior to cooking. Just watch any cooking shows on TV and we can appreciate that there are significant changes to the food once you start the heating process.

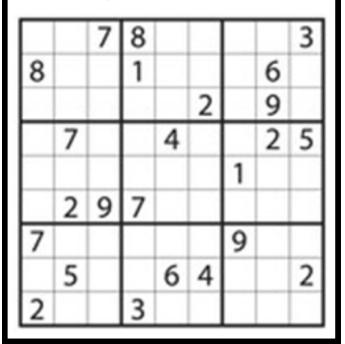
