


Vale Helen McMahon



GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

Oh, my goodness, how about that rain in late October, wasn't it amazing and what a time saver, we didn't need to water for a couple of days and the nitrogen that it brings with it greens everything up so well. And you can hear how excited I am, the ground is softer for pulling out weeds, it's nearly an enjoyable job, Mother Nature seems to know when we really need her and while it was raining, I started my second lot of fertilising, saves me watering it in, and what else does a gardener do when it's raining...... November is an amazing month in our gardens, hopefully not too hot so we can get some pruning done. Camellias, indeed, any flowering plant that has finished flowering can be pruned; it keeps them compact and encourages new growth. Great time for getting those hedges and topiary, looking fantastic and as roses come into bloom, take the flowers inside to spread their perfume, it's like a mini prune to push more flowers. If aphids are present on the new buds, you can wipe them off with your fingers or spray with soapy water from the dishes or washing (check the soap content first), or a garlic solution or plant garlic / society garlic amongst your roses. Tiny birds in our garden love aphids as do Lady Birds / beetles, so if you prefer, let nature help. watering for roses is preferable than evening to avoid powdery mildew. Irises are looking spectacular now and the variety of colours is so good, and they look great in a vase to give height coupled with shorter stemmed flowers at the front. To enhance further flowering pull or cut off the dead flowers. November, like October is a good month to follow up with a wetting agent around the base of your plants before the heat starts. We need to be assured that any moisture is getting to the roots of the plants, and this will pay dividends as Summer progresses and don't forget to mulch, it's invaluable to maintain cool, porous roots that can keep absorbing moisture to enhance the plant. Remember shallow rooting plants will display signs of stress quicker. If you're lucky enough to have a lawn, top dress it with a lawn fertiliser, (higher it Nitrogen), perhaps a weed and feed. If the soil is clay based, incorporate fine white sand and Gypsum and apply it every couple of months, preferably after it has rained and then water in well. If your lawn is on an incline you may need to aerate the area to assist in absorption. Less stress on your plants/lawn, the better. November is a great time to regenerate potted plants and hanging baskets that are looking a bit sad, before the heat. Best done in the shade, water well and apply Seasol then gently, without taking all the soil away from the roots, lift the plant ball out of the existing potting media, place it in a Seasol solution. emptying the old potting mix into a container/bucket, pop fresh potting mix into the same pot or



basket and place the plant back into its home. Water well and then follow up with the Seasol solution. Use the old potting media to fill any holes made by bunnies etc. If the weather is too warm wait for a cooler day or do it in the early morning, again, in the shade, and keep the plants in the shade, out of winds, until they have recovered from any shock. If you are potting back into a Terracotta, concrete and/or unglazed pot, you will need to refresh the paper / cardboard lining the inside of the pot before you refill with fresh potting media. This insulation stops the sun, warm weather drawing moisture away from the roots roots and literally drving through the porous pot. We've got lots to do, and don't we love it.

Bridge works, Wandong 1 to 30 November 2025



John Holland will continue works to prepare for construction of a new bridge in Wandong during November. There will be long-term temporary traffic changes in place during this time.

Work being done

- · Excavation and piling works
- Construction of bridge column and supporting bridge walls
- · Bridge abutment and retaining wall works
- · Material deliveries and concrete pours
- · Drainage and asphalting works
- · Roadworks alongside Epping-Kilmore Road
- Service investigations, surveys and utility relocation
- · Approved vegetation removal.

What can I expect?

- Works 7am-6pm Monday to Friday and 7am-1pm Saturdays
- Long-term temporary shuttle flow and traffic management on Epping-Kilmore Road and Broadford-Wandong Road
- · Minor traffic delays, allow additional travel time
- Nearby residents may experience some noise and vibration.

Machinery used

Trucks, piling rigs, concrete pumps, excavators, asphalt paver, tree grinder, mobile crane, and grader. Workers using hand tools and traffic management equipment.

How we're managing impacts

- · Traffic management and reduced road speeds
- · Access will be maintained to all properties
- · Environmental controls will be in place
- An arborist and qualified wildlife handler will assess all trees before removal.

Australian War Graves

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day signifies the annual Remembrance Day that marks the armistice signed on 11 November 1918 to bring the First World War to a close. When planning the November meeting of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea the convenor of meeting presenters thought it appropriate to acknowledge those who gave their lives in defence of our country. An approach was made to Office of Australian War Graves (Department of Veterans' Affairs) and the response was positive to the extreme.

On Monday 3 November 2025 Sheena Lambie Assistant Director, Official Commemoration and Information Services, and Samuel Convey Acting State Operations Manager – Victoria attended the meeting and made a memorable presentation.

Quote:-Australia has been committed to the Commeration of our war dead since the First World War. Founded out of the Imperial (now Commonwealth) War Graves Commission (CWGC), the Office of Australian War Graves (OAWG) was established in 1975 and afforded its statutory status under the War Graves Act 1980. The Second World War saw an increase in the volume and complexity of the work of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) and, to ensure the commemoration of casualties was appropriately managed, the CWGC created the then Anzac Agency, designed to undertake the CWGC's work in Australia and the Asia–Pacific region.

By the 1960s, much of the Anzac Agency's work was, beyond the Commission's remit, especially regarding the commemoration of 'post-war' dead, where Australia's eligibility rules and practices differed from those of the CWGC. Accordingly, the Anzac Agency was replaced in 1975 by the OAWG. The OAWG continues to maintain CWGC cemeteries in Australia, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands as the agent of the CWGC in these regions. The OAWG is also responsible for the Australian Governments program of official commemoration, extending to all conflicts beyond the two world wars and recognising those who have died as a result of their service.

The Office of Australia War Graves upholds this commitment today, caring for the commemorations of more than 356,000 Australian service men and women and veterans in over 2,300 sites of commemoration throughout Australia.

The Office of Australian War Graves (OAWG) is responsible for the care and maintenance of official war cemeteries and war graves. The Office of Australian War Graves, also provides and maintains, in perpetuity, official commemorations for eligible Australian service personnel who died during, or as a result of, their war or operational service, in military cemeteries, civil cemeteries, ashes placements, or at a Garden of Remembrance.

As an agent of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, the Office of Australian War Graves undertakes the care and maintenance of war cemeteries, war plots and individual graves of Commonwealth service personnel who died during the Two World Wars throughout Australia, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands.":-Unquote

The presenters showed an extreme of professionalism, both in verbal and graphic statements. Members were more than ordinarily attentive and posed a number of questions.

Australia wide there is a team of staff members who manage the planting, pruning and landscaping of the gardens in, official War Cemeteries grave plots and Gardens of Remembrance throughout Australia

The extent of Sam Convey's bailiwick was detailed in one of the many photographic images. His territory expands as far as Hay NSW and covers seventeen [17] sites.

The meeting came to a close with the presenters being thanked on behalf of the members. Some remained to continue discussion with Sheena and Sam.

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Bushfire Preparation

If you live in the regional areas, you need to be aware of the possiblility of bushfires and how to prepare for them.

Fires can occur where the suburbs meet the bush, particulary if you have grassy paddocks or bushland nearby. NOW is the time to make a fire plan with your family and get your house and property fire ready.

Fine fuels, such as thin branches, twigs and leaves, ignite quickly and burn easily. These can be carried by the wind and can end up long distances ahead of a fire. Heavy fuels such as branches, trees and logs, take longer to ignite but will burn for longer and they create an extremely hot fire.

These are our tips to help you prepare:

- · Clean out your gutters, roofs, and downpipes to remove leaves and clear around the base of trees;
- · Keep your lawns short and well-watered;
- · Maintain your garden by removing weeds, pruning bushes and trees, especially under windows:
- · Keep your garden beds moist using nonflammable ground covers such as pebbles, sand or rocks. Decomposed mulch is safer than a new mulch unless kept wetted down:
- · Store flammable and combustible materials, such as wood piles and rubbish, away from your house;
- · Remove flammable items, such as boxes & excess furniture, from decks and verandahs; and
- · Cut back branches within 10 metres of buildings.


1. Our walkways offer a selection of native flora ... this group of wattles will age and then die, but in the meantime they provide support for new gums to emerge.

Fire Season

Victoria is one of the most fire-prone areas in the world. All Victorians need to know how to plan for and respond to fire. We held a street corner meeting on Morphett Rise, Wandong, earlier this month, where residents gained information on how best to prepare their families and properties for the fire season. Let us know if you would like an information session close to your property. It is a great way to get the neighbours together and talk about specific risks and strengths that each area has.

Fire Restrictions

CFA fire restrictions have begun to be instated across the State. Restrictions will be brought into effect in **November** in the Mitchell Shire, date to be confirmed. The Fire Danger Period is when CFA restricts the use of fire in the community. This is to help prevent fires from starting. During the Fire Danger Period you cannot burn off unless you have a permit or comply with certain requirements. Welcome to our November 2025 update, where we share details of our recent exploration and community engagement activities. Exploration update

Southern Cross Gold Consolidated Ltd (SXGC) has continued its exploration efforts with activities aimed at better understanding the local geology.

Nine diamond drill rigs have been operating across the Sunday Creek project site which are collecting core samples from deep underground and will provide valuable insights into the mineral potential of the area.

An additional drill rig was mobilised to site at the end of October, taking the number of drill rigs to 10. This new drill rig will predominantly be working on regional drilling outside the main drill area.

In addition to drilling, the team is recommencing a soil sampling program at the end of October which will analyse surface materials. This will involve collecting surface soil for analysis at a laboratory for indicator minerals pointing to where mineralisation may be present underground.

A geophysical survey using surface recorders and realtime satellite data collection will take place in November as a trial for a non-invasive exploration method over the main Sunday Creek area.

Exploration tunnel update

SXGC is awaiting the government's decision on our application to construct an exploration tunnel. The application is being assessed by Resources Victoria, part of the Department of Environment, Energy and Climate Action (DEECA). It will also be assessed by other government agencies including the EPA, Goulburn Murray Water and other environmental departments within DEECA.

Maintaining our land

Our dedicated Land Manager, Jonna McLean, continues to responsibly and sustainably maintain and care for our farmland. Just some of the areas we've been focused on are:

- Willow tree removal along our Sunday Creek property boundary. Willow trees are considered serious environmental pests and are classified as Weeds of National Significance.
- Fencing is being renewed along our boundary lines, pictured above, with 10km completed so far.
- A dam has been renovated which will have helicopter access for firefighting, as well as a dedicated firefighting tank.




was in that affected area over time, who lived there and what they did, and what it looked like. There will be photos of then and now for comparison. We will also have a display of school memorabilia.



Deceleration at Frogs Hollow

Frogs Hollow is a locality in New South Wales. It is located on the Princes Highway, 13 km south of Bega and 19 km north of Merimbula. It is home to Majestic Motorhomes, Frogs Hollow Airfield, a Go-kart track, but nothing else except farmland.

With this utterance from the coach driver Roger "I think I have done an alternator belt" and the sound of the motor shutting down Frogs Hollow entered the history of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea. We were on a seven day excursion to Canberra and had overnighted at Lakes Entrance and Eden.

In the exact place where our delay commenced the road authority was undertaking road maintenance and single lane transit was in place so attending to the coach repair was just that much more difficult. But unflappable Roger set about solving the problem. His first aid required major surgery so local mechanics attended and after attention the coach was declared fit for purpose.

We continued on our way to Canberra. The unplanned stop gave passengers a chance to reflect on the past two days which included a boat tour of Lakes Entrance, the McKenzie River Rainforest Walk, the Eden Whale Museum and Batehaven Bay. Daylight saving meant that we still arrived at our destination with a sunlight greeting! Relaxed and well fed we headed for day one in Canberra. The Mount Ainslie Lookout, the Australians War Memorial and the National Museum of Australia, both gave us private guided tours.

Very memorable was the proactivity of our host at the War memorial, Michael Dowsett a Volunteer Guide! He took us to Panel Number 72 where he announced that the name of Benjamin Duffy was inscribed.

Benjamin was a native of Whittlesea and was killed on 3 July 1916 in France at aged 23. He is buried at Brewery Orchard Cemetery in Calais. The inscription on his headstone reads "I heard the voice of Jesus say come unto me and rest". Some of our members had vivid memories of the Duffy family and nodded as Michael related Benjamin's family details and his early life.

Feelings of sadness stayed with many but as the afternoon at the National Museum of Australia unfolded joy took precedence, particular those who took a trip back to earlier times and visited the Mr Squiggle and Friends Tour.

Next day we visited the much vaunted Canberra Floriade where folks found their own way around the extensive grounds and the many opportunities to purchase from a myriad of traders.

The theme for Floriade 2025 is "Science and Nature", transforming Commonwealth Park into a dynamic space of discovery and learning. The garden bed designs will draw inspiration from the most recognised scientific fields of physics, chemistry, astronomy, biology and botany, embodying the excitement and adventure of experimentation and pursuit of new ideas.

We picked Windows to the World weekend. Sixteen embassies hosted pop-up displays, offering visitors a sneak peek into the cultures and experiences featured in the upcoming program.

Visitors could enjoy traditional performances, sample authentic food and drinks, and explore exhibits featuring traditional clothing and cultural displays. Highly popular was the aptly named Turkish Delight supplied by the attendants at the Embassy of the Republic of Türkiye.

Visits and private tours at Old and New Parliament House were also organised and gave those who attended shining examples of "your taxes at work"! The guides were excellent and we all left with an understanding of what our elected representatives do to keep Australia ticking over.

Our last day in Canberra was a visit to the Canberra Carillion, but cold wind and an overcast day detracted a bit. It was a gift from Britain to mark Canberra's 50th birthday. The carillon houses 57 bronze bells, weighting a total of 32,000kg, which are played from a specially designed keyboard.

Local and visiting carillonists present recitals at the National Carillon throughout the year. These performances feature a wide range of musical styles from original compositions written specifically for the carillon, to



popular song arrangements and improvisation. The carillon often marks special occasions and is frequently included as part of broader public events.

In the same area are three poignant memorials. The <u>National Police Memorial</u>, the Australian *Merchant Navy Seamen's Memorial*. Both of these acknowledge those who gave their lives for their country most in highly tragic circumstances. The sinking of the Hospital Ship Centaur is just one example of "man's inhumanity to man"

One new memorial noted was The National Site of Recognition for Thalidomide Survivors and their Families acknowledges the thalidomide tragedy in Australia. It serves as a lasting reminder to all Australians that the lessons of the tragedy must never be forgotten.

With each carrying personal recollections of our Canberra excursion we travailed home with a short break at Gundagai and Beechworth where luncheon was the main focus. This trip was the first organised by Stewart Dickinson [assisted by Kirsten] who took on the mantle at the last Annual General Meeting. No grumbles were heard which gives him carte blanche to organise the next!

Benjamin Duffy

A coach load of members of The Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea recently took a seven day excursion to Canberra and visited the National War Memorial amongst other attractions.

Very memorable is the proactivity of our host at the War memorial, Michael Dowsett a Volunteer Guide! He took us to Panel Number 72 where he announced that the name of *Benjamin Duffy* was inscribed. He handed over notes he had collated.

Benjamin was a native of Whittlesea and was killed on 3 July 1916 in France at aged 23. He is buried at Brewery Orchard Cemetery in France. [Bois-Grenier is a village 3 kilometres south of Armentieres]

The inscription on his headstone reads "I heard the voice of Jesus say come unto me and rest".

Some of the members had vivid memories of the Duffy family and nodded as Michael related Benjamin's family details and his early life. He was the sixth of ten children of James and Margaret and lived in Beech Street.

Ben's family was very close and his mother and siblings were very involved in the local Anglican Church. Three of his brothers became Ministers of Religion.

Ben joined the Victorian Railways as a Porter. In 1908 at aged 14 Ben had been awarded a Certificate because he had never missed a day in all his years at school.

In July 1915 he joined the Australian Infantry Forces [AIF]. Pte Duffy embarked from Melbourne aboard HMAT Nestor [His Majesty's Australian Transports] on 11 October 1915. He was killed in action on 3 July 1916 in France.



His internment took place under the control of Rev J L Cole Chaplin of the 14th Infantry Battalion and he was placed at rest as noted above.

Brewery Orchard Cemetery contains 339 Commonwealth burials of the First World War. There are also four Second World War burials and five German war graves.







Landcare Grows Connections at the Wallan Community Market

The Upper Plenty Merri Catchments Landcare Group brought a fresh burst of green to the Wallan Community Market last month, setting up an energetic stall to introduce more locals to their work and raise funds for local environmental projects.

Throughout the morning, volunteers shared stories about the group's wide ranging efforts in activities ranging from creek restoration and weed control to native habitat planting and citizen science programs, and encouraged visitors to get involved in future activities.

To support ongoing projects, the group sold locally grown native plants and protective plant guards, which proved popular with residents keen to attract native wildlife and to add resilient, attractive indigenous species to their gardens.

Information about upcoming Landcare events and opportunities to participate was also available at the stall. Locals were invited to join in activities such as planting days, citizen science monitoring, and hands-on workshops aimed at improving the health of local creeks and habitats.

The Landcare team expressed appreciation to the Wallan Community Market organisers and fellow stallholders for their warm welcome and support. The day was a great success in building connections, raising awareness, and generating funds to keep Landcares local environmental projects thriving.



Citizen Science Grant Boosts Local Environmental Monitoring

The Upper Plenty Merri Catchments Landcare Group has also received a major boost with the announcement of a new Citizen Science Grant. This funding will expand the group's hands-on environmental projects and hopefully engage more local residents, especially families and children,in caring for the local landscape..

The grant will support the purchase of monitoring equipment, educational materials, and the delivery of community work-

shops that teach practical environmental skills. These initiatives will help residents better understand and assess the health of local ecosystems, with the data collected contributing to regional biodiversity and waterway monitoring.

The new funding builds on the group's longstanding work in the Upper Plenty and Merri Creek catchments, where volunteers continue to restore native vegetation, improve creek health, and enhance local biodiversity. It also recognises the strong community spirit and environmental stewardship that have long been hallmarks of the region.

Support for Young Carers

Approximately 1 in 10 carers are under the age of 25, however many don't identify themselves as a young carer. This may be because family members, teachers and other service providers may not be familiar with the signs of being a young carer.

If you are aged 25 or under and care for someone, you may be a young carer.

Being a young carer can have a number of different challenges.

- You might find it hard to find the services and help you need to look after the person you care for.
- You might find it hard to do well at, or get to, school when you look after someone else.
- You might find it hard to make or keep friends, or to go out and socialize or have the time to do things that interest you.

Young carers often take on a range of different responsibilities, such as:

- · shopping, cooking, cleaning, washing and household chores
- · specific care tasks such as assisting with mobility, grooming, bathing, toileting
- support and monitoring of the family members needs
- managing financial issues property maintenance, paying bills, banking
- · care for other siblings in the family
- liaising with service providers and health care professionals e.g. making appointments, discussing treatments and medications
- · interpreting for family members where English is a second language, and
- looking after siblings who have a disability if a parent is unable to look after them because of their own health issues.

All young carers should be able to enjoy life and to reach their potential. Help for young carers is available through the Carer Gateway. Our dedicated young carer worker is ready to help.

Best Of Breed - Forget about the show ring, consider the family dog...

When owners contact the Centre they usually seek help with problems that they encounter when their dog is perhaps 8-12 months old. I get told all the varied stories and I hear their frustration. It is important to empathise without judgement but my job is too sort thru the information and help find a workable solution for the family.

Truth is, the problems experienced are rarely the fault of the dog... after all... "The Dog is Just Being a Dog"

Humans can easily let their emotions override commonsense when making life decisions. So perhaps the breed or personality of dog selected does not meet your expectations. So here let's review some of the common reasons given regarding their choice of dog....

1. I grew up with (heeler/labrador/GSD/insert breed here) when I was a kid and they were great dogs.

Yes they might have been great dogs ... but you were a kid... chances are your parents had to deal with the dog so you where unaware of the problems and frustrations they might have dealt with - In the first 12-24 months of your dog's life there where probably many times your parents wanting to send the dog away to "live on a farm". Also go back a couple of decades lifestyles were different. As a kid you might have had a big backyard to play with siblings and a few times a week you would grab your bike and dog and meet neighbourhood kids to play. 



Pickleball is a racket sport played indoors or outdoors by two or four players using smooth paddles to hit a perforated plastic ball over a 34-inch (0.86 m) net.

The game shares similarities with tennis and table tennis, but uses unique paddles, balls, scoring, and court markings, often on a badminton-sized court. (For size comparison you could fit 4 pickle ball courts on a standard tennis court). Each side of the net features a 7-foot non-volley zone (the "kitchen") where volleys are not allowed.

Pickleball is very popular among seniors worldwide because it involves less running than many other sports, reduces fall risk, and provides good cardiovascular exercise.
