One of the disciples (a doctor) describes the event in Luke 2/7 Mary brought forth her first born Son and wrapping Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a cattle feed box as there was no room at the inn.

This is where the action is, this is where the wise men gathered to assure the crowd that this little baby was in fact the chosen one, the one that was already fulfilling the prophecy of the old textbooks! GARDEN SCENE WITH GAIL

Christmas 2025!'

We can be sure we are heading into the hottest part of the year but how good has the rain been, saving us time with not needing to water and the plants love the nitrogen that the rain provides. Nitrogen is so beneficial to a plant's growth, it promotes lush leafy growth, strong stems and it enhances the plants' ability to absorb other nutrients and resist stress. It's a good all-rounder. When we water, we need to add things that can assist in a similar way, isn't nature a time-saver. After the rain we've had we need to watch our plants if/when the weather becomes drier that can catch us off guard in a matter of days, hot winds, hot days, warm nights can happen so quickly, let's face it, we can and have done, had four seasons in one day. Plants in pots and hanging baskets will dry out quicker and if you are going away it might pay to ask a friend to water for you or upend a bottle of water into the pots, the soil will only absorb the water if it becomes dry. Saucers under pots are great or big trays that will take a few pots together and pop them out of the hot windy areas. Hanging baskets can be taken down and also popped into trays or in an old bath, they can dry out and be knocked around in the wind. Once a plant dries out it isn't easy for the roots to draw up moisture again, the important fibrous roots can shrivel not allowing a good supply of moisture and nutrients to the plant, and the plant struggles making it more vulnerable to heat stress and disease. Dried out soil can become hydrophobic, that is it resists moisture much like a new tea towel doesn't dry well until it has been washed, making our gardening harder to try and play catch up with the season. If you haven't netted your fruit trees it may be a good time to do so before the fruit gets much bigger and can be damaged or knocked off the tree by throwing the netting over and ensure they receive a consistent supply of water and fertiliser to be able to produce a good crop as with the veggie garden as well that may benefit from a liquid fertiliser instead being quick growing to maturity. As Summer progresses keep a look out for any wilting on new planting as these are susceptible to drying out due to their immature root system. Deep waterings are essential to encourage the roots deeper to minimalize drying out, fertilise regularly and keep a good layer of mulch around the base of the plant. If you still need to prune, choose a cooler day and keep water up to the plant/s being pruned and follow up with an application of Seasol. Australian made, this product reduces stress in plants due to planting, drying out, climatic conditions etc however, if your plant is



waterlogged it will need to be raised up so it doesn't drown! Either dig it out and replant at a higher level, incorporating gypsum and well-rotted cow manure or try and raise it gradually by digging around the plant as deep as possible and 'under_pin' all the way around, using a mix of Gypsum and well-rotted cow manure because the soil needs to be improved as well as the soil level of the plant. If we have similar weather as we had in November, it will be fantastic. Something unusual in the garden, a birdbath with a difference, use an old vase, clear glass or whatever you fancy and top it with a decorative dish that you can glue on to the base, it's your personal touch and it will look fantastic, and the birds will love the colours shimmering in the water. Have a beautiful festive season and stay safe.

John Holland will continue works to prepare for the construction of a new bridge in Wandong during December 2025 and January 2026.

Work being done

- · Excavation and non-destructive digging
- Construction of bridge column, abutments and supporting walls
- · Crane mobilisation
- · Steel girder delivery and assembly
- Roadworks and drainage construction alongside Epping-Kilmore Road
- · Road construction on Broadford-Wandong Road

What can I expect?

- Works 7am-6pm Monday to Friday and 7am-1pm Saturdays
- Round-the-clock works 7am Saturday 6

Help to Adjust to Social Media Bans

With new laws in Australia coming into effect from December 10, 2025, many popular social media platforms will no longer allow under-16s to hold accounts. While this may feel like a big change, there are constructive ways young people can adapt and stay socially connected - without losing touch altogether.

Why the law is changing

The goal of the law is to protect younger Australians from harmful design features in social media that can encourage excessive screen time or expose them to inappropriate content.

Importantly, the restrictions are not meant as a lifelong ban — they're more of a "delay until you're older" approach.

Under-16s won't get into trouble simply for having an account; instead, the responsibility lies with platforms to block or deactivate underage accounts and face penalties themselves if they fail to comply. Here are some practical strategies for under-16s to handle this transition without feeling cut off: Stay active on allowed apps — Many services aren't affected by the law, especially messaging apps, gaming platforms, educational or creative tools. These can still let you chat, play, collaborate or express yourself online.

Use new creative or supportive platforms — There are young-people friendly online spaces and forums (that remain allowed under the law) for creativity, discussion, support and learning. These can help you stay social while avoiding risks.

Use public content (without logging in) - For some platforms, even if you can't have an account, you can



still view public posts or videos. That lets you stay upto-date with trends, content, or communities in a more passive way.

Explore offline or local activities — Use this as a chance to engage more in real-life friendships, hobbies, sports, arts, or local community groups. Offline connections can bring a different kind of balance and satisfaction.

Talk openly with friends and family — It's okay to feel upset or disconnected. Sharing how you feel helps. Families can make plans to hang out together, talk regularly, or find safe ways to socialise without relying on social media.

While losing access to social media can feel like missing out — especially if many friends are online the change also offers a chance to build social, emotional and digital maturity before diving into the pressures of social media. It can also reduce exposure to harmful or distracting content and help create healthier balance between online and offline life.



Exploration update

SXGC's application to construct an exploration tunnel at Sunday Creek has been approved. Notification of the approval was distributed to the Clonbinane, Waterford Park and Ryans Rise communities immediately with residents living close to the project site informed directly.

Secondary permits to meet environmental and construction standards are now being obtained. Work has also begun on finalising processes to ensure the commitments made to minimise social and environmental impacts e delivered.

Surface construction works will commence in early 2026. Local contractor Lincoln's Earthmoving will prepare the site entrance roads, offices, workshop spaces and build water storage dams. The tunnel is expected to take 6-9 months to complete and will allow 24/7 underground drilling once constructed.

Surface drilling will continue during daytime hours.

Community feedback was incorporated into the tunnel's final design and impacts throughout construction and operation will be carefully monitored and managed.

The project will create jobs and our focus on sourcing local staff and contractors first will continue.

The approval still only allows exploration activities and does not permit mining. Any future mining license application requires a separate, comprehensive approval process.

Our community is encouraged to find information about the project including updated FAQs, fact sheets and the final site layout under the "Exploration tunnel" tab at southerncrossgoldcommunity.com.au.

We will keep residents informed before and during construction and will provide updates to the broader community through newsletters, social media, local media and its community website.

SXGC food drive supports our community

New acoustic sheds manage noise

SXGC has recently installed two acoustic sheds on diamond drill rigs to further reduce the noise impacts of our surface drilling. The sheds are innovative world-first designs owned by our drilling contractor Deepcore Drilling that reduce sound emissions by 20 percent.

Deepcore Drilling designed and manufactured the sheds in Bendigo which have a green exterior to ensure they blend in with their surroundings.

Southern Cross Gold Consolidated exploration tunnel has been approved

Southern Cross Gold Consolidated (SXGC) will continue to work closely with local communities after receiving approval from the Victorian Government to build an exploration tunnel at Sunday Creek.

Construction of the tunnel is expected to start in early 2026 after additional environmental permits are obtained. The tunnel is expected to take six to nine months to complete and will allow underground drilling 24 hours a day with surface drilling continuing during daytime hours.

Community feedback was incorporated into the tunnel's final design and impacts on neighbours, the wider community and the environment throughout the tunnel's construction and operation will be carefully monitored and managed.

The project will help create jobs for the local community while also providing opportunities for local contractors and suppliers. SXGC's focus on sourcing staff and businesses from the area will ensure continued support for local economic development.

The approval granted for the tunnel is limited to exploration activities only, enabling SXGC to accelerate geological and resource understanding at Sunday Creek. It does not authorise mining. Any future mining proposal would require a separate, rigorous licensing and approval process.

SXGC will keep residents informed before and during construction and will provide updates to the broader community through newsletters, social media, local media and its community website.

Fire Season

Victoria is one of the most fire-prone areas in the world. All Victorians need to know how to plan for and respond to fire. We had a successful street corner meeting on the corner of Mount View road, Wandong in November with many residents coming to gain information on how best to prepare their families and properties.

Victorians are being urged to prepare for an increase in fire activity across large parts of the state this summer, according to the Australian Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Summer. Having a fire plan with your family and reducing the vegetation around your home by mowing lawns and clearing gutters are some of the most important things you can do to prepare for the higher risk weather season.

Fire Restrictions now in!

Fire Restrictions in Mitchell Shire were declared from the 18th of November 2024 and will continue until 1st of May 2025 unless revoked earlier. The Fire Danger Period is when CFA restricts the use of fire in the community. This is to help prevent fires from starting. During the Fire Danger Period you cannot burn off unless you have a permit or comply with certain requirements. 

Summer is here and so are our fire restrictions. Restrictions came into force for the Mitchell Shire Council on Monday 17th November and will remain in place until further notice.

Penalties for lighting fire illegally during Fire Danger Period and on Total Fire Ban days include large fines and possible imprisonment.

Head to the CFA website to found out more about your legal obligations during the Fire Danger period & days of Total Fire Ban.


During the Fire Danger Period it is important to know what the Fire Danger Rating is.

Fire Danger Ratings tell you how dangerous a fire could be if one started.

They are important because they help you decide what actions to take to protect yourself and others from bushfires and grassfires.

Fire danger ratings are shown in the same way across all of Australia, so whether you're at home or travelling, you will see the same rating system.

The new Fire Danger Ratings



Fire Danger Ratings will be issued on days when there is a fire risk.

Each fire danger rating will have a clear set of messages including the actions the community can take to reduce their risk.

Ratings are forecast using Bureau of Meteorology data for up to four days in advance, based on weather and other environmental conditions such as vegetation.

The rating is your trigger to take action to stay safe.

Fire Danger signs are located at the top of Spur Road, Broadford-Wandong Road (near Clonbinane Exit ramps) and the corner or Broadford-Wandong Road/Clonbinane Road. These signs are changed by our members and will also be updated on days of Total Fire Ban. Fire Danger Ratings can also be found on the CFA website or on the VicEmergency app.

Brigade activities

You may see our vehicles out on the roads on Wednesday nights and Sunday mornings as our members continue to train for the fire season. If you wish to seek further information about property preparedness, please drop into the station at 10am on Sunday morning or contact us through our Facebook page. Santa Run – Santa will be in Waterford Park on Monday 22nd December, he will be travelling around the estate and will make his way to the reserve from 6pm.

A visit to Geelong

The spring day held out according to the forecast when members of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea ventured down the National Highway M80 to Geelong in mid-November.

The itinerary was to visit the Amazing Mill Markets and Moorabool Valley Chocolate with an included buffet meal at a selected hotel.

In 1824, explorers Hamilton Hume and William Hovell reached Corio Bay, the site of modern-day Geelong, after a long overland journey south. The M80 crosses Hovell Creek which reminded me that long ago, when it was just Geelong Road, I came across a Hume's Concrete truck crashed into the creek. So Hume and Hovell were reunited!

The Amazing Mill Markets lease space to hundreds of different stallholders, each location has a diverse range of wares and new stallholders are always welcome.

They advertise that there is invariably something for everyone who visits with vintage clothes, vintage furniture, memorabilia, art, glass, jewellery, books, antiques and collectables. This was found to be true, but the visitors were more "tyre kickers" than purchasers.

Nevertheless some were still exploring when it was time for the coach to take us for lunch. Interestingly the once prominent Ford factory near the luncheon venue has undergone some "badge engineering" and highly visible warehouses and outlet barns steal the limelight.

Moorabool Valley Chocolate began in May 2005, operating from a farmhouse kitchen built in the 1920s. That was soon outgrown, and a bedroom at the front of the house was converted into a commercial kitchen.

In 2011 the chocolatiers moved out of the shared kitchen into a dedicated chocolate preparation area. Chocolate moulding machines and an enrober were purchased. Later, a spinning machine to assist in making hollow figures such as Santa and Easter bunnies was installed.

Chocolate Enrobing is the process in which centers (such as pretzels, chips, or cookies) pass under a "waterfall" of chocolate and become blanketed in a smooth coating. Toppings and/or a drizzle can also be applied to the surface, resulting in a distinguished, delicious treat!

Heralding Christmas

Attending a long-time friend and work colleagues' funeral service the Speaker Coordinator at the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea was more than overly impressed by the choir.

The memory was so impressive that it became obsessive to have the choir attend the Christmas meeting at Whittlesea and provide the traditional carolling session. Several exchanges and a visit by the musical director/conductor Birute Prasmutas, and assistant/accompanist Zita Prasmutas sealed the deal. And as they say 'the rest is history"!

The choir in 2025 had 24 singers with 13 taking part in the concert for the Probus Club at the Whittlesea Bowling Club. They all made their own arrangements to attend and brought their piano and traditional costumes.

The Bowls Club made special arrangements to provide a dressing room separate from the room allocated to the general meeting. Extra seating was also provided.

The Melbourne Lithuanian choir "Dainos Samburis" was formed in 1949 and is celebrating its seventysixth [76th] year. The choir is based at Lithuanian House in North Melbourne, and practices Tuesday evenings. [Translated the title is Song Gathering]

Each year the choir sings at the Lithuanian Independence Day concert around the 16th of February, Baltic Deportations to Siberia commemoration in June, National Day in July and a Baltic Concert in October (this year in Estonian House). The choir's annual concert is in November. This year it was entitled "Christmas with Samburis". There were only two years without a concert and that was during Covid lockdown.

Every second year the choir performs in the Song Festival during the Australian Lithuanian Arts Festival. The next festival will be held in Melbourne in 2026 between Christmas and the New Year.

Over the years the choir has performed for Lithuanian communities in all the capital cities of Australia (except Darwin), in the USA, Canada, New Zealand and Poland.

When Lithuania regained its independence, choir members travelled "home" to sing in the Lithuanian Song Festival in 1994, and have taken part in subsequent festivals held every four years, including 2024 when 9 choir members took part in the finale.

Resplendent in their traditional costumes the group moved into place with murmurs of excitement from the assembly. So the concert, that was not only unique but multi lingual commenced. Songs were delivered in Lithuanian, English and Latin and German.

It was interesting to watch audience members known to have musical talent absorb the presentations. Once the tune is obvious the lyrics, in any language, come to the fore.

The six songs presented covered the celebration of Christmas ideally. They were:-

Christ is Born [Sveikas, Jezau, gimusis]

Christmas Hallelujah

Silent Night [Tyli naktis]

Aussie Jingle Bells

O Come, All Ye, Faithful [Ateikit dzaiaugsmingai]

Child in a Manger [Gul siandiena]

The solemnity of Christmas can be delivered in any language, but to have it delivered in song by a dedicated professional choir is something that becomes ingrained in one's memory.

Conductor Birute led the renditions, interspersed with anecdotal stories of the choir members and the significance of the song they were rendering

The meeting came to an end with rousing applause. The members went their annual Christmas dinner and the visitors changed back into street attire made their way home to normal activities.

The opportunity to have an internationally acclaimed Choir donate their time to the Members of the Combined Probus Club of Whittlesea should be recognised as something very special and is a good Christmas Gift for those who attended.



Carer Gateway – Managing your wellbeing during the festive season

- 3. It is OK to change your plans if your instincts tell you that plans are no longer appropriate, then it is ok to change your mind. If you think the person you care for will be unsettled, give yourself permission to cancel or shorten your plans to fit the situation.
- **4. Ask for help** we often struggle to ask for help and try to be all things to everybody. Remember that you too are important, so delegate tasks, get some rest and say no to things as appropriate to ease some of the stress.
- **5. Be Positive** it's likely that something over the festive season will go wrong. In fact it is almost inevitable. Try not to panic, keep it in perspective, stay positive and try not to let it disrupt your plans.
- **6. Self-care** find time to do the things you enjoy and that allow you to reset and focus on yourself for a little while. This may be going for a walk, reading or enjoying a bath.
- 7. **Eat well** It's tough to eat well during the festive season, there are so many things to tempt us away from a healthy diet. Whilst it is ok to enjoy the food and treats on offer, remember to maintain a balanced diet. Eating healthy foods helps to keep you energized, and combined with getting both sleep and rest, can help you cope with the extra stress of the season.
- 8. Plan ahead remember that many shops and services are either closed or have limited hours over the festive season. Make sure you are organized to ensure you have enough medications and other supplies as needed.
- **9. Enjoy yourself!** whilst not everything may go as planned, there will also be times across the festive season that are meaningful and bring you joy. Embrace these as they happen.



She still has her job and loves to teach kids tricks, but also earns the right to take a step back from the work. Rumour is now more content with a quick run around and then crash for a snooze on the couch or to bask in the sun.

Into the Future: Rumour first developed her social skills within our own small pack she then passed these skills to the litters she raised. We have her daughters and grand-daughters and even a great grand-son living with us who carry forward her skills into the future.



We have loved our journey with Rumour and are glad with the choices we made on her upbringing. A healthy natural diet and plenty of exercise means she is healthy in body. Then with good boundaries and life experience we have a dog who has Self-Control and Self-Confidence.

This has made her transition into her senior years fairly seamless.

Keeping your dog fit and agile throughout their life can reduce potential issues as they age.




